Victim of Haiti Regime

Montreal — (RNS) — Tired and showing signs of strain, the first group of Jesuits expelled by Haiti's dictatorial regime returned this week to provincial headquarters in Montreal. Eighteen — 13 priests and five brothers — were deported because, according to Francois Duvalier's government, they had documents "likely to imperil the security of the state." Father Robert Jean, shows the effects of detention and abrupt deportation. Vatican Radio said that the Duvalier dictatorship had "done much to the detriment of the Church in Haiti in recent years." Since 1959 Duvalier has expelled three bishops and 17 priests or various pretexts. Canadian Jesuits started their Haiti mission in 1953.

Drop 'Non-Catholic' Term Irish Jesuit Proposes

Cork — (NC) — A prominent Irish ecumenist urged Catholics to drop use of the term non-Catholic.

Father Michael Hurley, S.J., of Dublin in a lecture here indicated that such negative terms should be replaced by positive identifications which have no ring of segregation about them. Urging Catholics to join other Christians in working to better the social and cultural climate, the Jesuit said that knowledge of each other's distinctive ways and customs is a minimal requirement for Christian fellowship.

Predicting that the ecumenical council will issue a decree on ecumenism before 1964 is over, Father Hurley said that Irish Catholics will support it "despite our national propensity for illiness, political and Celtic laments."

Nephew, Sing Requiem For F. J. Dolan
