

Opening Set For Court Tourney

Upwards of 2,000 fans are expected to be in the stands at the War Memorial tomorrow night when Aquinas Institute and McQuaid Jesuit High clash in the opener of the Sixth Annual Diocesan Basketball Tournament. Game time for the sixth meeting of the two cross-town rivals is 8 p.m., but a good share of the crowd will be on hand much earlier than that to watch the newest diocesan high schools, Cardinal Mooney and Bishop Kearney, go battle in a 8:30 p.m. non-tourney preliminary.

On Sunday, the tournament spotlights shift to Geneva and Auburn, where the other four contenders engage in quarter-final competition. Notre Dame of Elmira, a leading contender for the title being defended by Aquinas, will be at Auburn against Mt. Carmel in a 2 p.m. game, while Padua High of Watkins Glen will take on Desales of Geneva in a 7 p.m. game at Geneva.

McQUAID (14-4) holds an early season victory over Aquinas (13-5) and is favored to emerge in the tournament. But this has become a game where predictions are meaningless once the shots begin flying and the high-scoring Irish will be out to prove it. Aquinas, with a 77-82 offense-defense record, compares favorably with McQuaid's 71-58. Comparative scores against common foes like Edison and Franklin also offer

little choice, the Irish splitting a pair of tight decisions while McQuaid was a narrow winner both times.

The Knights, highest-scoring squad in the school's history, will start senior Sam Iaconone and four juniors—Tony Leonardo, Mike Spiegel, Lance Compa and Bob Brady.

AQUINAS will counter with senior Tom Pestorius, its 88 center. Junior forwards Jim Caverly and Bob Keegan, backcourt senior Frank Wosnick, and either Tom Bonelli, or junior Jim Calone.

Leonardo (15.6) and Pestorius (15.1) are the team's top scorers, but Caverly (12.2), Compa (13.3), and Langene (11.8) are all liable to break loose on a given night.

Aquinas, well-tested after a two-week layoff, will be relying on its height advantage and speed to offset the man-for-man edge held by McQuaid's well-balanced squad. In the December game of the series (in which Aquinas holds a 5-3 edge) the Irish were on their way to a one-sided loss before they rallied to finish only 3 points down. Coach Jack Kelly hopes they'll pick up right where they left off that memorable 35-point last quarter. McQuaid's Ken Jones prefers to think about the first three, when his Knights built a 21-point lead.

In the opener, Kearney's 14-2 record and previous 55-48 win over Mooney (11-6) make it the favorite, with another close game in the offing. The Kings, coached by Mike Spang, will be led by high-scoring Scott Shales (14.3), rebounder Walt Sarlacki, and forward Tom Rood, whose second-half scoring decided the first game. Jim Van Allen's Mooney squad will counter with 15-point man Terry Murphy, 6-2 center Tim Kier, and guard Kevin Eagan, all of whom scored 10 points in a losing cause last time.

Sunday's games will see DeSales and Padua trying to salvage a tourney win from losing seasons and underdog Mt. Carmel trying for an upset of heavily favored Notre Dame. DeSales will have to stop Padua's Rich Kvedrovicz, whose 21-point average makes him the tourney's high-scoring threat. Carmel has a different problem, faced with a Crusader team that has all of its starters in double figures, led by veteran guards Ron Limoncelli and Mike Johnston.
