'Gradual' Change in Church Rites

Vatican City (AP) — The secretary of the Vatican's new liturgical commission said that Pope Paul VI's motu proprio which initiates the changes in the liturgy voted by the Vatican Council, aims at "gradual and natural evolution."

Father Annibale Bugnini, C.M., spoke in a 2,000-word article in the Vatican City daily, *L'Osservatore Romano*.

The amended text of the motu proprio — a document issued on a pope's personal initiative — is soon to be published by the Holy See's official publication, the *Acta of the Holy See*.

FATHER BUGNINI reviewed the relationship between the

motu proprio and the Constitution on the Liturgy, passed by the Council and approved by Pope Paul on Dec. 4. He noted a number of changes which the motu proprio puts into effect as a result of the constitution. He also dealt with the relations between the Holy See and national bishops' conferences in the matter of authorizing translations of liturgical texts from Latin into vernacular languages.

The bishops' conferences of Canada and of France, Belgium, Switzerland, Austria and Germany have already inaugurated the use of the vernacular instead of Latin in the reading of the Scripture lessons at public Masses.

Commenting on this part of the motu proprio, Father Bugnini made two points. The first is that the document "fully recognized the competence of the various territorial authorities as regards translations of the vernacular of liturgical texts." But at the same time he noted that "it leaves confirmation of the acts up to the Holy See."

Father Bugnini's article reviewed the motu proprio article by article, beginning with the first norm that deals with the establishment of liturgical instruction in seminaries, institutes and theological faculties starting with the academic year of 1964-1965.

\$150 for \$5 Your Money Multiplies

New York — (AP) — Did you ever wonder where your contribution goes after you put it into last Sunday's collection basket for Catholic Relief Services?

It goes to your pastor, as you know; and then to the chancery office, and finally to the CRS bank account. But what happens then?

One point to stress is that you give much more than you ever remotely realize. Your \$5 bill or check in the basket last Sunday is multiplied more than 30 times under the expert, careful handling of CRS officials, with very important help from the United States Government.

How does this happen?

Catholic Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference—has authorization, and in fact is invited by the U.S. government, to distribute U.S. surplus food and other products in the name of the American people. The food is given to the needy people; the U.S. government pays ocean freight to a port in the designated country. Then it is up to CRS-NCW to get the food to the areas where it is needed—most.

CRS tries to get the recipient government to pay the inland freight costs—but it has paid these itself, when the government was unable to do so.

At the area where the food is needed, CRS arranges for its distribution through local charitable organizations—and, it is

emphasized, without regard to race, creed or color. CRS officials point out that one of their largest relief programs is in Morocco. Morocco is probably 7 per cent Christian—and a lesser percentage Catholic.

In this connection CRS works with other agencies and helps many kinds of non-Catholic institutions. In many countries CRS is the only agency distributing U.S. surplus food.

He has followed the example of Pope John XXIII who renewed the ancient custom in which the Pope joined priests and faithful in Lenten exercises at designated churches.
