What is beyond Dan and Bernabes does not concern me." The second view is to see the globe in the Devil's hand, to view the earth as his possession. This is the way Satan presented the kingdoms of the earth to Our Lord on the Mount of Temptation: "All these are mine." These are the most frightening words in Sacred Scripture. But there was a condition under which Our Lord could have had the globe: "Fall down and adore me." The Devil was saying to Our Lord: "You want to put a Cross on top of that world? The participants, two from each college, will meet Friday night and Saturday.

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
