## Deadline Nears For HN Bowling Tourney

Reserve entries for the 29th annual Holy Name bowling five-man handicap tournament are due tomorrow, Saturday, March 14 and final entry deadline is one week later, Saturday, March 21.

A record number of teams from New York and Pennsylvania are expected to participate in the 1964 ten pin event which opens in Rochester the

weekend of Saturday, April 18. The tourney, sanctioned by the American Bowling Congress and under the auspices of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association, is scheduled for 23 consecutive days at the Bowl-A-Roll Lanes, 1560 Jefferson Road, from April 18 through May 10.

The tourney fee is \$2.50 per team. The price ratio will be at least three prizes for each ten entries, with prize fee returned 100% in prizes. The championship contest is open to all Catholics who are members of the ABC. Highest ABC average in any ABC sanctioned league last year must be used. The scratch average being 950 pins maximum for this five-man event. Handicap is based on 70% of the difference between team average and that average, and that figure. Entries can bowl only once. Teams or individuals bowling in unsanctioned leagues are not eligible to bowl in this tournament.

Entry blanks, available at all bowling halls, must be in the hands of Fred Enders, P.O. Box 1955, Rochester, New York 14603 or 175 Oneida St., Rochester, New York 14621, or phone HO 73327 by midnight, March 14. The entry fee must accompany each blank.

Joe's Barber Shop team of Rochester won top prize of \$900 and engraved trophies as the 1963 tournament winner. 1318 teams participated in last year's competition which was the second largest in the association's history. 475 prizes were awarded totaling \$14,952.50. The five-man tourney is second only to the New York State Bowling Ass'n. tournament, statewide, in both entries and prizes, according to Fred Enders, secretary and tournament manager.
