

## Sacred Heart Takes Basketball Trophy

Sacred Heart Grammar School won the Rochester Diocesan Parish Basketball grammar school white division Catholic Youth Organization championship by defeating St. Thomas Apostle 38-32 at McQuaid, Sunday. Sacred Heart had defeated 12 regular season opponents and had won over Holy Rosary and St. Mary's of Canandaigua in the tournament.

St. Patrick of Elmira won the grammar school green division championship and the high school championship. St. Patrick Grammar School defeated St. Mary's of Corning 37-30. They had defeated St. Jerome, East Rochester and St. Michael, Penn Yan to advance to the finals.

The high school team of St. Patrick's parish won a hard fought game over St. Thomas Apostle 68-45. St. Patrick advanced to the finals by beating St. Margaret Mary and Blessed Sacrament. St. Patrick High School thus gains possession of the Bishop Kearney trophy for one year.

In the consolation games of the C.Y.O. Tournament at the C.Y.O. Auditorium, Sunday, Holy Rosary defeated Holy Family, Auburn 39-31 and St. Jerome won over St. Louis 49-38 in the grammar school games. In the high school section, Sacred Heart beat St. Margaret Mary 56-47.

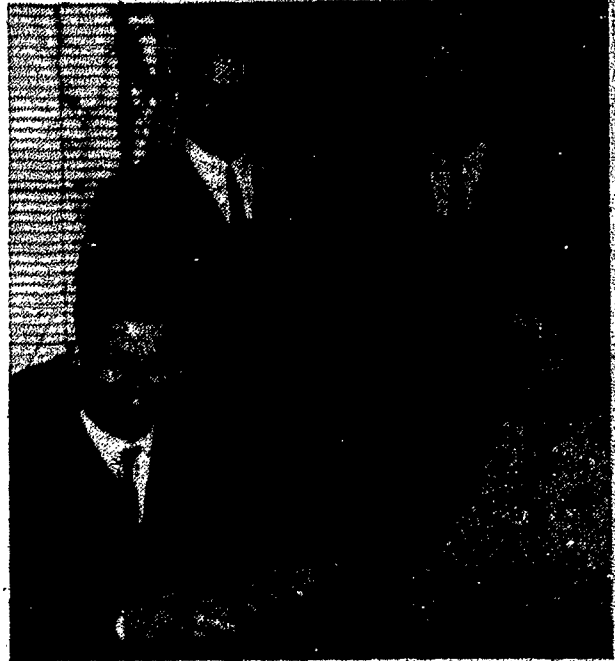
