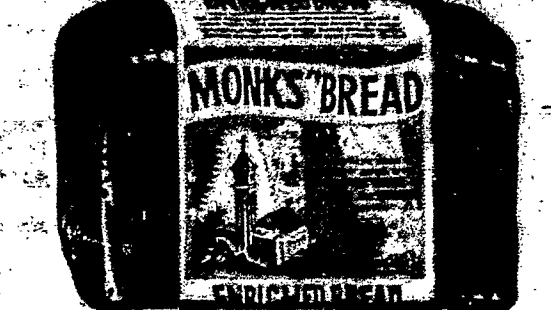
She was a member of St. Dominic's Rosary Society.
