

Cathedral, Parish Churches List Holy Week Rites

Holy Week at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Mother Church of the Diocese, will be marked with solemn rites as follows:

Palm Sunday—Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey, Cathedral pastor, will bless the palm at 4 p.m., preside at the procession honoring Christ the King and celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass.

Palm will also be blessed earlier and will be given at the Masses on Palm Sunday, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11:10 a.m. and 12:15 noon. All these will be low Masses.

Confessions daily, Monday through Wednesday, 7:15 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Monday Mass, Monday through Wednesday, 12:15 p.m.

Afternoon Mass, Monday through Thursday, 5:30 p.m.

Confessions Wednesday 3:30-5:45 p.m., 7:30-9 p.m. Brief sermon by Father Louis J. Hoffman, spiritual director of St. Andrew's Seminary, at 5:30 p.m. Mass.

Holy Thursday—Low Masses at 7 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. Bishop Kearney will pontificate at the Solemn Mass of the Blessing of the Holy Oils at 9 a.m.

Confessions, 4:30-5:30 p.m. and after the evening Mass.

Holy Communion will be given at the 7 a.m., 8:30 p.m. and 7:45 p.m. Masses.

Bishop Casey will celebrate the Solemn Pontifical Mass of the Last Supper at 7:45 p.m. Sermon by Father Hoffman.

The Blessed Sacrament will be reserved in the Repository beginning at 8:30 p.m. The Cathedral will remain open throughout Thursday night and Friday morning for private visits and hours of adoration.

Good Friday—Afternoon service will include: Stations of the Cross, 1:45 p.m.; sermon by Father Hoffman, 2:10 p.m.; Bishop Casey will celebrate the Solemn Liturgy of the Passion and Death of Our Lord, 2:30 p.m.

Holy Communion will be given during the Solemn Liturgy at 3:45 p.m.

Veneration of the Relic of the True Cross will take place during the Solemn Liturgy and after the evening service.

Stations of the Cross, Sermon by Father Hoffman, Benediction with the Relic of the True Cross, 7:45 p.m. Confessions heard today only after the evening service.

Holy Saturday—Confessions, 3:30-6 p.m.—7:45-9 p.m.

Easter Vigil Service including Blessing of the New Fire, Paschal Candle and Baptismal Water, Renewal of Baptismal Vows, Litany of the Saints, 7:30 p.m.

Bishop Casey will celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass of the Easter Vigil at 8:45 p.m.

Holy Communion will be given during the Mass about 9:20 p.m. (Attendance at this Mass does not satisfy the Sunday obligation.)

Easter Sunday—Low Masses: 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 a.m. and 12:30 noon.

Bishop Kearney will celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass at 11 a.m.

Music for Palm Sunday's Pontifical Mass, for Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil services and for the Pontifical Mass on Easter Sunday will be furnished by St. Bernard's Seminary Choir. Rev. Robert Smith is choir director; Mr. Frank Pilecki, Cathedral organist. Students of St. Bernard's will also conduct the ceremonies.

ALL PARISH churches will conduct similar rites. Parish bulletins should be consulted for precise times of services.

Cato Parish Marks Jubilee

Cato—At a special Mass of thanksgiving celebrated by Rev. Elmer Heindl, pastor, on March 17, St. Patrick's Parish, Cato, began its ninetieth birthday celebration.

This was followed by a parish supper and St. Patrick's Day party in the Church Hall on Main Street.

St. Patrick's parish began as a mission of St. Joseph's Westport, the first Mass being said by Father Albiner, probably in the year 1853. This Mass was celebrated in a private home about one-half mile north of the village of Meridian.

The Catholic population at that time was mostly Irish emigrants who had come to this area seeking employment on the Erie Canal and the New York Central Railroad. The fertility of the soil attracted many farmers who were leaving Ireland as a result of the potato famine.

Aquinas Spurs Equity Law

Aquinas Institute is credited for a new school bus law scheduled to be voted through the New York State Legislature this week.

The new law, proposed by Senator Edward J. Speno of Nassau County, will eliminate the present discriminatory practice of forcing privately operated schools to use only franchised buses. Public schools are exempt from the requirement.

Aquinas Institute officials complained they were forced to use more costly transportation when neighboring public schools were free to use a less expensive means.

THE PRESENT Church property was purchased in 1868; construction of the church was started in 1874 and completed the following year. A Catechetical Center on East Main Street, opened in 1939, is used for many parish activities. Released time classes are taught here during the school year and in summer the Sisters of St. Joseph conduct classes.

Rochesterian, Father Hart Named Aquinas Principal

Rev. Leon G. Hart, C.S.B., vice-principal and former student at Aquinas Institute, has been named principal of Aquinas.

He will succeed Rev. Fergus J. Sheehy, C.S.B., who remains religious superior of the 45 Basilian Fathers who staff the program of Basilian study in 1944, after he graduated from

Aquinas. He earned his bachelor of arts degree from St. Michael's College in the University of Toronto and his master's degree from the University of Rochester. He also studied at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He was ordained in Toronto by Cardinal James McQuigan in 1953.



FATHER HART

Father Hart has been the Aquinas vice-principal since 1958. Prior to that he taught at Catholic Central High School in Detroit, Mich. and at St. Thomas High Schools in Houston, Texas. He is the first Rochesterian to head the school since the Basilian Fathers assumed direction of Aquinas in 1937.

He is the son of Mrs. Leon G. Hart of 36 Eglantine Rd. and the late Mr. Hart, for many years a teacher at the old Palmyra Trade School. The Harts are long time residents of St. Charles Borromeo parish.

Father Hart is well known in local education circles and holds membership in the National Education Association, the National Catholic Education Association, the Basilian Education Association and currently he is president of the Rochester chapter of the Catholic Counselors Association. He is also a member of Phi Delta Kappa, an educational fraternity.
