

McQuaid Takes Crown

With junior Tony Leonardo leading the rebounding and scoring in championship style, McQuaid Jesuit High captured its third diocesan title on Saturday in a 68-47 victory over Notre Dame of Elmira at R.I.T.'s Albee-Clark gymnasium.

An SRO. crowd watched the game, in which Leonardo tallied 27 points and grabbed 18 rebounds. Karler Aquinas gained consolation honors in the first annual tourney by routing DeSales of Geneva, 54-38.

McQuaid had anything but an easy time with the Crusaders from Elmira, whose 17-3 record riding into the game stamped them as a definite title contender. In the early going it was 12-0, on 1995, by an 8-3 count as Jerry Knoplock, Ken Limoncelli and Bill Knott hit our fouls and John Barnock took a pass from Knott for a layup.

LANOE COMPA was the only knight to score for the first 15 minutes, but then Leonardo broke loose. He cashed 3 fouls and a jump shot to tie it up and rebounded from underneath for a goal that put McQuaid ahead, 14-12, right at the quarter buzzer.

As it turned out, the Knights never trailed after that. Four points by Mike Spiegel and a drive by Leonardo gave them a 22-14 lead with 8 minutes to go in the final, and the Crusaders never closed that gap in the danger point. They were within 25-20 when Compa and Leonardo clicked on jumps and drives for 5 baskets and a 35-24 half-time advantage.

Senior Sam Iannaccone, who along with Joe Miller and Vince Posso closed out his scholastic career in the victory, scored twice from underneath to give the Knights a running start into the second half, secured by Notre Dame hanging doggedly in the closing.

The Crusaders were down by 15 at 45-30 before they were able to launch a sustained comeback. Knott, Knoplock and John McCarthy led them back up to 53-55, but a fast break went awry, and Iannaccone's layup off Bob Brady's feed restored the initiative to McQuaid for the final two minutes.

FOR McQUAID the victory capped a 18-4 season that saw the Knights win 12 of their last 13. Compa and Iannaccone, with 15 and 10 points, wound up sharing the scoring laurels with Leonardo, paralleling the season-long statistics. And, for coach Ken Jones, it was the first diocesan title, coming in his second year at the helm. He'll have four of his five starters back for a defense of the crown in '68.

For Notre Dame, the loss marked the fourth unsuccessful entry into the finale. Four seniors led Jim Flynn's scrappy Crusaders in the disappointing windup to a banner season. Limoncelli had 18, Knott 13, Knoplock 11, and McCarthy 11. Knott, incidentally, led all tournament scorers with 47 points in 3 games.

The preliminary game, six senior Tom Pestorius wind up his Aquinas exploits with a brilliant shooting exhibition that netted 24 points. The 8-8 center, weighed 12 of 18 shots from the field, including 10 of his last 12.

Mooney Team Posts 11-7 Season Record

The Cardinals of Cardinal Mooney High School finished their first year of JV basketball with a very respectable won 11, lost 7 record. During the season many team and individual records were set.

The Cardinal Mooney Fresh also completed a successful season with 14 wins and 4 losses. The top scorers for the Mooney Fresh were Tom Bringley 156, Steve Conover 113, Jim Harrington 217, and Dick Palumbo 252. Jim Harrington was the team's rebounder for the Fresh.



Highlights of the season were double wins over arch rival Bishop Kearney and the Notre Dame of Batavia JV's. Back court men Dan Scholiker and Tom Hayes should be commended on their fine defensive ability. Second string center Dick Musciow did a fine job when filling in for Jim Harrington.

Jerusalem—(RNS)—Al-Difa, Arabic Muslim daily published in the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem, belatedly joined the international controversy over Reif Hothuh's play, "The Deputy," by charging that it had strong Jewish backing.

"World Zionism," it said, "staged the anti-Plus XII play to bring pressure on the Vatican to recognize the State of Israel, and to acquit the Jews of responsibility for Carter's murder."

The paper declared that despite the fact that Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, had denounced "The Deputy" as "an outrageous denigration of the Honor of Pope Plus XII," Jewish influence "keeps the play in the very heart of Christianity."

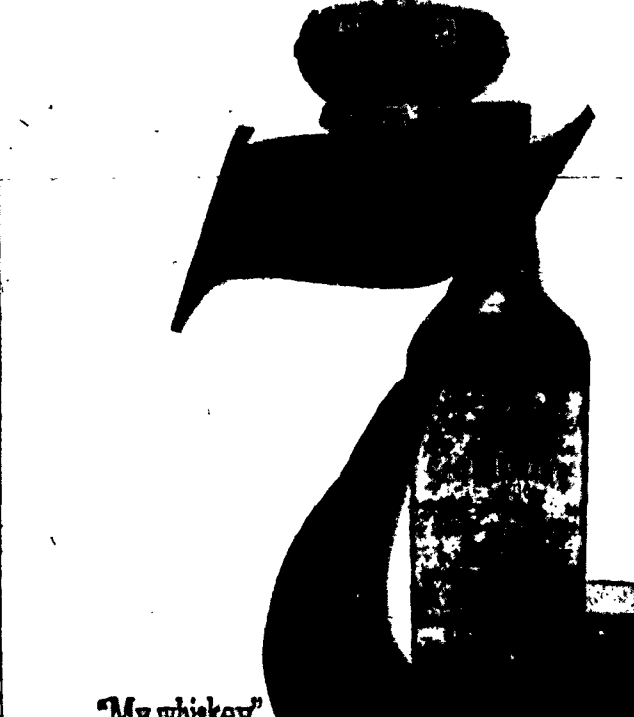

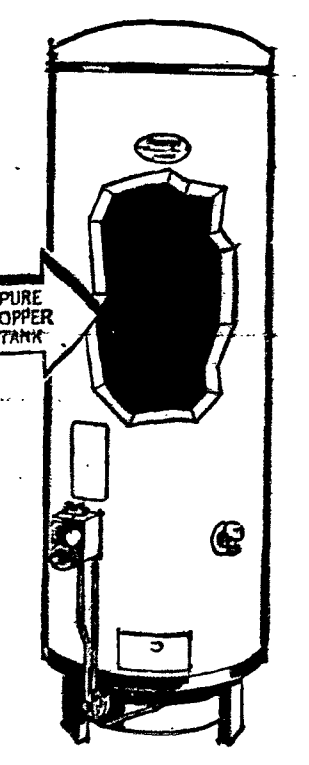
