Sr. Succursu Requiem Held In Hornell

Sister Mary Succursu of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy died unexpectedly in her sleep Sunday, March 22, 1964, before dawn in St. Ann's Convent, Hornell. She had not been ill. Sister Succursu has been the principal and fourth grade teacher in St. Ann's School for the past ten years.

A member of the staff of Aquinas Institute for ten years, Sister Succursu taught in the social studies department there from 1945-1954.

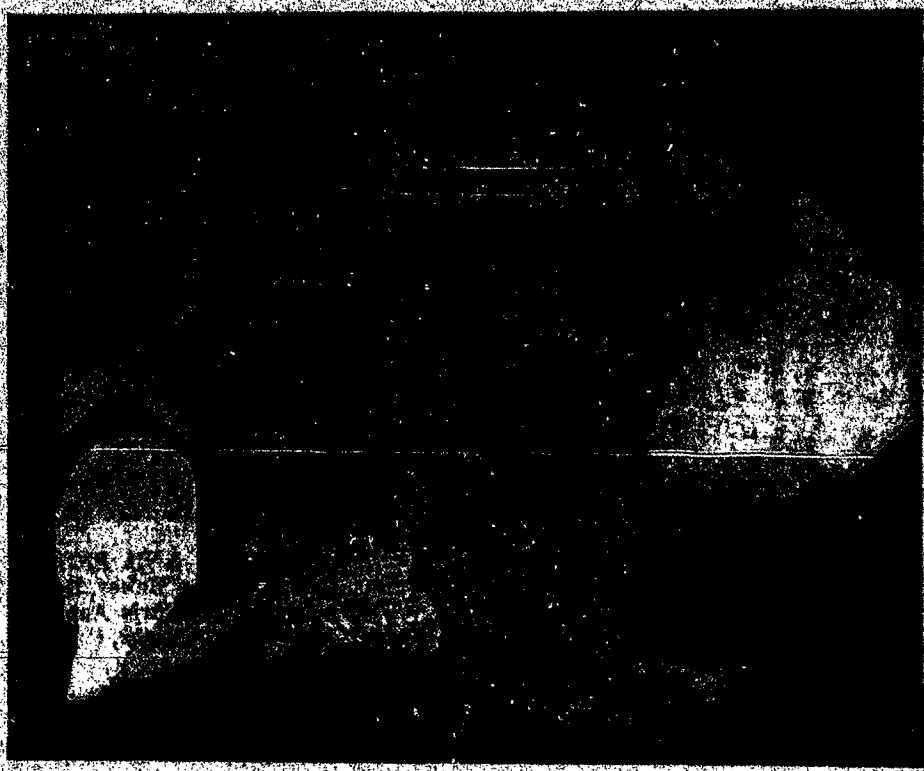
Other Rochester schools in which she taught are: St. John the Evangelist, St. Thomas the Apostle, Mount Carmel and Old Saint Mary's.

She had been both superior of the Sisters and principal of the school at St. Vincent's, Corning and at St. Patrick's, Owego.

Sister Mary Succursu was born Frances O'Hagan in Buffalo. She entered the Rochester Sisters of Mercy in 1918 and taught for 46 years in the schools of the Rochester Diocese. She was a graduate of St. Bonaventure University.

The Rev. Hubert Bisky, pastor of St. Ann's Church, Hornell, celebrated the Requiem Funeral Mass, Wednesday, March 25, at 10:30 a.m. in the parish church.

Sister Succursu is survived by four sisters: Mrs. Adam O'Neil and Miss Cornelia O'Hagan of Hornell, Miss Agnes O'Hagan of Washington, and Mrs. Grover McKibben of Detroit.

Wehle Fishing Contest Sets Opening April 1

The Louis A. Wehle fishing contest will be conducted for the 19th consecutive year, starting April, coincidental with the opening of the trout season.

As in previous years Wehle, former Conservation Commissioner of New York State and chairman of the board of the Genesee Brewing Co. Inc., of Rochester will offer \$5,125 in cash prizes for the largest freshwater fish entered in each of 12 classifications. Prizes will be awarded monthly for the seven-month period ending Oct. 31, at which time grand prizes will be awarded for the largest fish in each classification entered during the seven-month season. Licensed guides are also eligible for prizes if they guided winners of a grand prize at the time the prize-winning fish was caught.

There will be available 195 monthly prizes, 36 grand prizes and 12 guides' prizes. The eligible fish are largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, rock bass, northern pike, walleyed pike, muskallonge, perch, pickerel, brook trout, brown trout, rainbow trout and lake trout. The contest is open to all residents of New York State for fish caught in New York State waters on rod, reel and line.

A new fishing guide listing previous winners, how to identify some of New York State's fish, the best prize-winning lures of the past, the best fishing months of the year, and much additional interesting information is now available at sporting goods stores, boat liveries, tackle shops, fishing camps, hardware stores and wherever fishermen congregate. 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England Studies Fixed Easter

London — (RNS) — British Home Secretary Henry Brooke told Parliament that in view of the Second Vatican Council's recommendation of a fixed date for Easter, the time might be right to revive the Easter Act.

Passed by Parliament in 1928, the Act provides that Easter should always fall on the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April. It was to become effective when the government found conditions opportune.

Such a date has never been set because, as Mr. Brooke explained, "the effect would be that for a period Easter would be celebrated on a different date in the United Kingdom than in the rest of the world."

But since the Vatican Council last fall indicated its general sympathy with a permanent date for Easter—if agreeable to other Christian communions—Mr. Brooke indicated that "a new situation would arise if a worldwide agreement among the Churches on a fixed Easter seemed to be attainable."

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
