At Our House

Happy Easter!

From our house to yours, gather all good wishes for a most happy Easter.

Also, from our house to yours, to answer to some readers' requested questions and comments from readers on previous Easter columns.

To begin on the light side, several people have asked for "The Shortest Easter Poem" mentioned a year or so ago, one written by the Head of the House. We would venture to say it is perhaps the shortest poem ever published on the subject, just two words:

"Lent"
"Went"

If you know of a shorter, let's hear it. (We don't say better poem!)

Now in answer to the homemakers who wrote in protest of the unfavorable reaction at our house to the Holy Thursday dinner of herbs, lamb unleavened bread, real liturgical feast for this special day.

"We find such a dinner not only symbolic and meaningful but delicious!" wrote a lady who has served it to her family for several years. "It's one we look forward to from year to year."

"Perhaps," she suggested quite realistically, "you didn't do your homework sufficiently to make it look pretty and taste good?"

THE LADY WAS right. On the next go-round, we tried harder and realized that our mistake had been with a heavy hand on the bitter herbs, plus a piece of lamb that was not exactly the butcher's delight.

From another reader about:

"For the 'egg tree,' use a fine needle to prick holes here and aft of raw eggs. Peck away at the hole with the fine needle until hole is sufficiently large to blow the yolk and white out of the egg. Don't use an iron pick. That's what made them break. After blowing out the contents, eggs are ready to color and hang by ribbons on a centerpiece of greenery or spring blossoms. Gilding some of the eggs gives a pretty effect and adding liturgical symbols makes them more appropriate for the day."

A new glaze for your Easter ham can be made by blending 1 cup ginger ale, 1 up orange juice, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon each ginger and washed, grated orange peel. Simmer uncovered until glass is thick. Brush ham several times with this after ham has been skinned, during its browning period of 25-30 minutes.

The colored hard boiled eggs can be used for several days—egg salad, creamed eggs, etc.—if they are returned to carton and put in the refrigerator after being "found" by the children and "rolled" for a reasonable length of time. Don't leave them unrefrigerated overnight.

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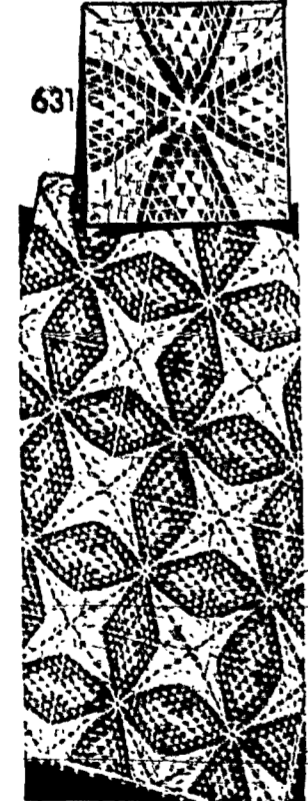
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
