**Sister Brigid Named
Principal At Hornell**

Hornell — Sister Mary Brigid, superior of St. Ann's Convent, has been named principal of St. Ann's School, the Rev. Hubert A. Bisky, pastor has announced. She succeeds Sister Mary Succursu who died March 10 after 19 years as administrator of the school. The appointment, effective immediately, was made by Mother Mary Bride, mother general of the Sisters of Mercy, in the Rochester Diocese, and the councillors of the religious community.

Sister M. Brigid has taught first grade at St. Ann's School for the past seven years. She will continue as first grade teacher for the remainder of this school year in addition to carrying out her administrative duties.

FATHER BISKY, said he was confident that the "new principal will receive the same excellent cooperation from pupils and parents and the Hornell community as that given Sister Succursu. That cooperation was more than evident," he continued, "in the magnificent tribute paid Sister Succursu at her funeral Mass."

Sister M. Brigid, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Quinn, is a native of Rochester. She was graduated from Mercy High and Nazareth, where she is now taking extension courses in education. She helped organize the remedial reading program carried on in Rochester diocesan schools and for 10 summers has been instructor in schools in Rochester, Corning, Fairport and Elmira.

Last summer, she made an extensive tour of Europe visiting countries on the continent and British Isles for seven weeks.

Sister M. Brigid's entire teaching career has been devoted to the first grade. Before coming to Hornell, she taught at St. John's School and Mount Carmel School in Rochester and
