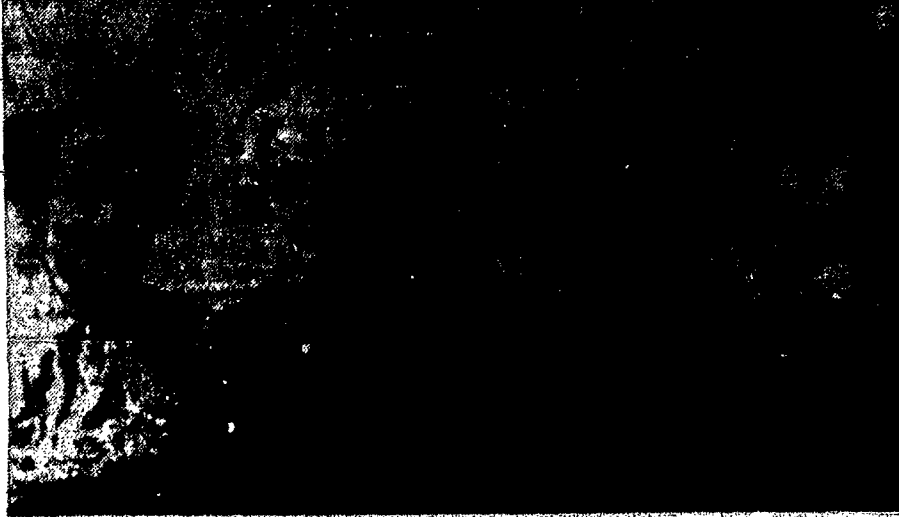

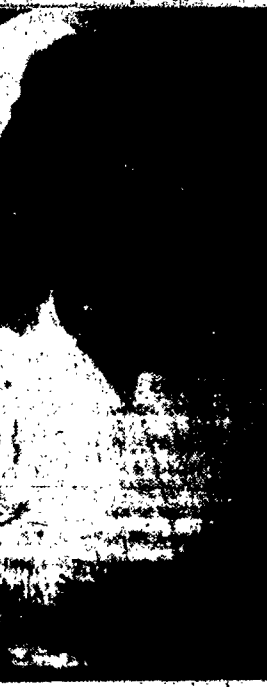

Better Tell Her

Dear Loretta: Our child is adopted but this fact is not known to her. Actually, she is no longer a "child" but a young lady of 18 years of age who will be making her debut in society in a few years.

We moved to this city about 10 years ago and none of our friends knew that our daughter is adopted. Under the circumstances, isn't it wise and proper to keep the adoption a secret?

Dear "Mother": It has always been my opinion that every adopted child should be told as early as possible that he or she was especially chosen by the parents to be their little boy or girl.

I have three reasons for this conviction. First, it is the truth. Secondly, this course of action allows the child to develop full security in the knowledge that she was chosen and that she is the object of deep love. And thirdly, it precludes the chance of shocked discovery later on with the emotional disturbance that may accompany it.

K of C Stamp Book Campaign Totals 12,396

Father Matthew Killian, Catholic Chaplain of Eastern Correctional Institute, located at Napier, N. Y., has furnished Knights of Columbus State Deputy Edward J. Kunzinger a report on the campaign, "Stamps Within the Walls."

This campaign is to provide a Chapel for the inmates of the institution. It is estimated that approximately 12,396 books of various denominations and \$3,700.00 in cash were contributed by Knights of Columbus throughout the State. Recently, a newsletter was issued regarding ground breaking ceremonies. A stimulus of interest was shown from this letter, by donations of money and stamps being sent to Father Killian which is being received daily. In addition to currency and stamps, 42 memorials are reserved, a total of 22 are available at the present time.

Construction of the Chapel is about 75% complete and according to reports is expected to be ready for occupancy sometime in June. The prayers of the Chaplain and his men are being offered for the kind remembrance of the members of the Knights of Columbus for their continued success in this drive.

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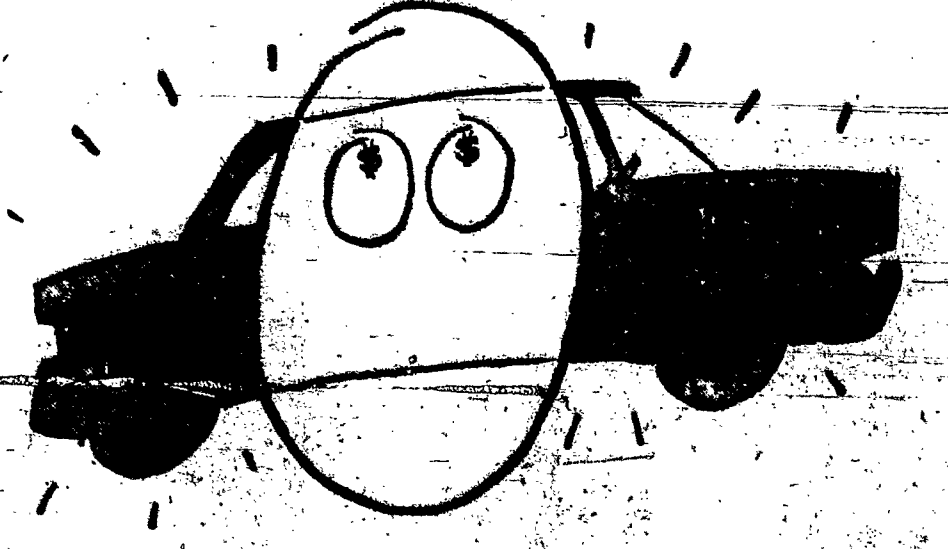
