

## Basilians Plan Rite At House Of Studies

## Civil Rights Problem For Sisters In Selma

"Do those things really happen in the South that you read about in the papers?" The following account relates the experience of two Sisters of St. Joseph from the Rochester Diocese stationed at the Sisters' mission in Selma, Alabama.

As they stood, no one paid attention to those who left or returned to the line, or anyone who ate or drank. An elderly white couple were back to try to register again because they had failed the first time.

Finally, at 2 p.m., the three registrars returned from their lunch. The Sisters and their companion were then taken to a room where each was given the same question to answer—how many Congressmen from Alabama are in the federal House of Representatives?

Two of the registrars were extremely interested in how one of the Sisters had answered a question about bearing arms for her country. She had stated she would not because of service in a religious congregation. They found the negative answer most unusual — "Even clergymen's wives answer yes!" They asked if Sister was a conscientious objector.

The Sister asked if they had ever heard of any religious women who had been called upon to bear arms. A registrar replied that women in Europe bear arms. This was an answer to Sister's question.

Then another registrar said to do nothing and to bear arms meant the same thing: That was all. They would hear in three weeks whether they had passed or not. It was 3 p.m. when the Sisters left the courthouse.

## Parent Classes Listed At St. Mary's Hospital

The 14th series of Parent Classes sponsored by St. Mary's Hospital began Monday, April 6 in the hospital auditorium at 8 p.m. Parents are attending Monday and Wednesday evening classes for three weeks.

Parents are referred to this program by their family physician for its benefits and prepares them for upcoming parenthood.

Instruction includes lectures, movies and exercises. Every effort is made to make medical terms easily understood. Explanations are given about the recovery room, close observation procedures and the special care unit for infants. Discussions stress diet, rest and exercise as important factors to the mother's health.

THE SERIES covers prenatal care and nutrition, labor and delivery and the care of the newborn. Liberal discussion periods are planned enabling the parents to ask questions about anything that worries them.

As a planned approach to parenthood, St. Mary's provides the parents a tour of the maternity department, introduces staff personnel and briefs them on admitting procedures. Such knowledge about the department and its personnel helps to reduce tensions and misunderstandings.

The classes are designed to inform parents that pregnancy and childbirth are perfectly normal physiological processes and are nothing to be afraid of. Both staff and personnel at St. Mary's agree that such instruction is valuable to parents and to the hospital.

Success of the program is indicated by the attendance. Attendance exceeds the planned number of 12 pairs, for usually from 15-18 parents attend. Instructors from St. Mary's nursing staff on maternity and nursery care are Miss Jane Howe, R.N., Miss Helen Bernard, R.N., Miss Margaret Hart, R.N., and a Nutritionist, Miss Helen Fleming.

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## Clubs Curb Dropouts

Pittsburgh — (RNS) — Neighborhood study halls are being opened by the Diocese of Pittsburgh for high school students with scholastic difficulties or poor home study conditions.

Aimed also at curbing school dropouts, the study halls are located in predominantly Negro and urban renewal areas. They are available to all students, regardless of race and creed.

The study halls are supervised by teachers from local schools and by college undergraduates majoring in education. They will be open from 8 to 8 p.m. daily.

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
