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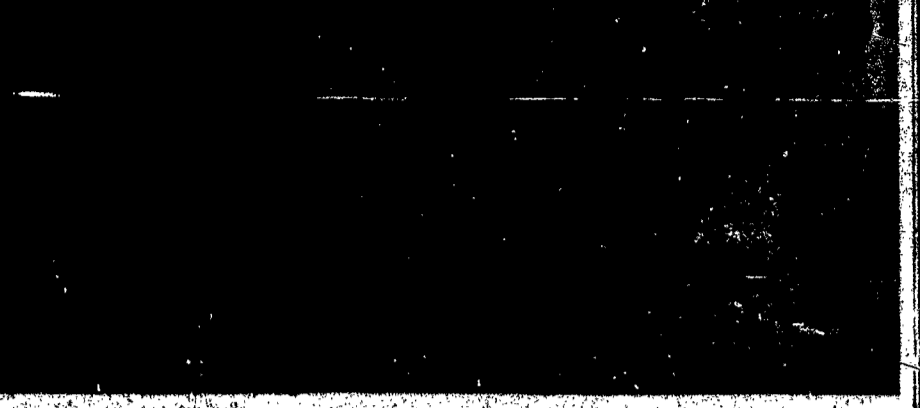
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N.C.C.W. State Leaders Meet

Peace Corps Wants 5,000 Teachers

Washington—The U.S. Peace Corps has announced that it will need more than 5,000 teachers to fill its overseas teaching posts during 1964. Requests have come from 48 countries throughout Latin America, Africa and Asia. 3,000 are wanted for secondary schools, 1,000 for elementary and 500 for colleges and universities. An additional 500 are wanted for the fields of physical, vocational and adult education.
