

# Lynd Wins Title In Aquinas Bouts

## Catholics Honor Russian Icon

San Francisco — (NC) — The Holy Icon of Our Lady of Kazan, perhaps the most venerated of all Russian icons, will be enshrined in a Catholic church here April 12 and 13 in a display of Catholic-Orthodox ecumenism.

Archbishop Joseph T. McCarroll of San Francisco will lead the procession accompanying the 17th century icon into St. Basil's church and will preside at a Divine Liturgy (Mass) in the Byzantine Rite and preach the sermon.

From San Francisco the icon will be taken to the New York World's Fair, where it will be enshrined in a replica of the historic Fort Ross Russian Orthodox chapel, first chapel built by the Russians on their migration from Alaska to California.

# Sue Warden Wins Title In Skate-off

Twelve-year-old Sue Warden made the juvenile title bout, skating title last Saturday in the Hudson Valley and Middle Atlantic States Championships held at Yonkers. After falling in the 4th and 6th rounds, she won the 6th round to receive three ways to the championship.

In a special skate-off of 350 yards, Sue took first place and the championship. Her time was 1:08.5. Her time in the 500 was 1:13.7.

This was Sue's final event of the season. She had been a doubtful starter from the beginning of the season due to an extended illness but went on to win almost every championship event she entered. The week before, she was injured in a fall at the U.S. Open Championships and was unable to compete in the remaining events for the championship.

Her coach, George Blackburn, has given praise to Sue's "great fighting spirit." "At the beginning of the season there was considerable doubt as to how many skating meets Sue would enter, or if she would enter," Blackburn said. "But despite the handicaps of several weeks behind in her training due to her illness, Sue went out to a fine season."

Sue is a student at Our Lady of Good Counsel School and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.H. (Bus) Warden of Ravenwood Ave.

# New Free Schools in Peru

Lima — (RNS) — Major steps far-reaching results throughout Peru. The school has been named San Martin de Porres, in honor of the recently canonized Peruvian saint. It will care for the poorest children of Cuzco, descendants of the famed Inca who were subjugated by the Spaniards.

Teachers' salaries will be paid by the Peruvian Ministry of Education. The school will begin with an enrollment of 300 and gradual expansion is planned to some 800.

In Lima, meanwhile, Cardinal Landauzzi's double-session schools will provide tuition-free education for children newly arrived from mountain areas.

Writing in Airline magazine, published by the Catholic Broadcasters Association here, Father McNaspy said the televising of the funeral of Pope John XXIII and President Kennedy gave examples of the great service TV can provide. In Cuzco, meanwhile, the first tuition-free Catholic school in Peru to be staffed by a team of teachers of several religious congregations will be opened by Archbishop Carlos Jurgens, C.S.S.R.

Archbishop Jurgens, a 65-year-old leader of social reforms, was the first bishop to inaugurate agrarian reform on Church-owned land in 1963. His initiative in staffing a school entirely through the cooperation of a number of religious orders is expected to have
