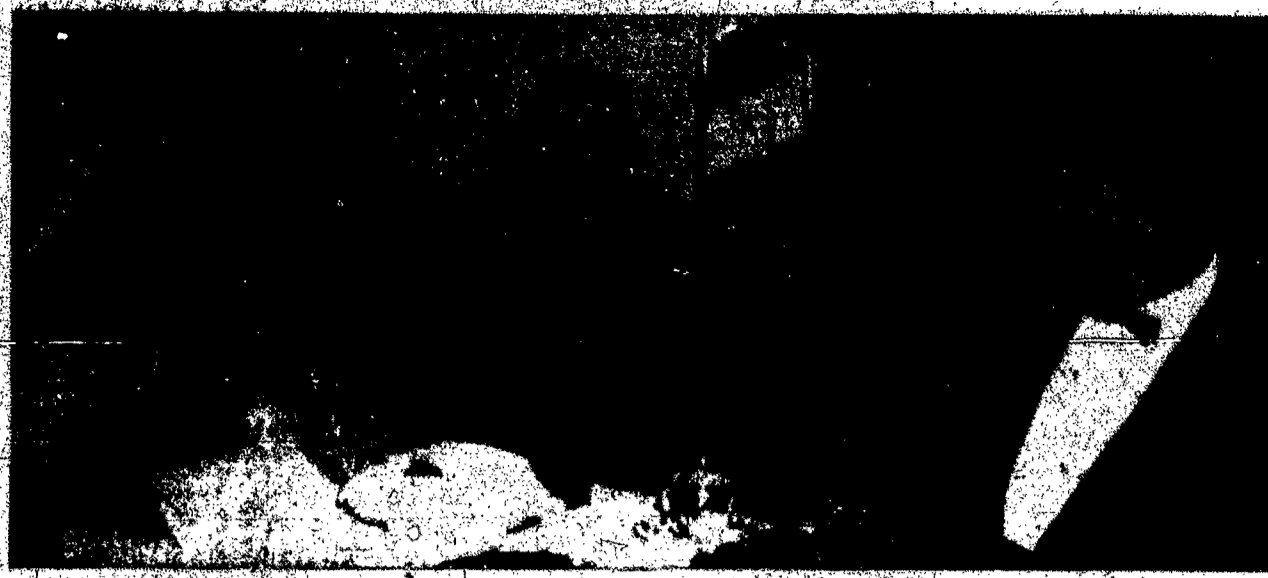


Family Service Dinner Draws 500 In Elmira

Silver Jubilee To Be Marked

Rev. Miroslav J. Myschychyn, pastor of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic church, Elmira Heights, will offer a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving in observance of his twenty-fifth anniversary of ordination on Sunday, April 26 at 10 a.m.

DINNER honoring the jubilarian will be held in the church annex at 5:30 p.m.

Father Myschychyn was born in Detroit, Mich. on Nov. 25, 1913 the son of the late John and Sophia Prystacky Myschychyn. One of ten children, he was baptized at St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic church in Detroit by the Rev. Eugene Bartosh, now retired and living in WaterVliet, N.Y.

The family returned to the Ukraine where Father completed his education and was ordained by the Most Rev. Joseph Kocjowski, Bishop of Premysl who was arrested and died in a Russian Communist prison.

As a young priest he served as an assistant in the Village of Woloscha and in December of 1939 was drafted in the Russian Bolshevik army and released in a few weeks. In May 1941 he was arrested by the NKVD, Russian Secret Police but was released upon claiming American citizenship.

During the German occupation he was assigned to Lubachiv as a teacher and catechist. After the surrender of Germany in 1945 he continued to serve in the same capacity under the Polish communist regime and later was arrested by the Polish Secret Police.

Following this he escaped to Warsaw and served there as Chaplain for the Benedictine Sisters.

He returned to United States in 1946 and was an assistant at Immaculate Conception Cathedral in Philadelphia. Later assignments were at Amsterdam, N.Y., Buffalo, Niagara Falls and Stamford, Conn.

The 34th Anniversary Dinner of the Family Service also brought Bishop James E. Kearney who received commendation from Monsignor Gallagher for the Bishop's many areas of service to answer the pressures exerted on him to provide large schools, institutions and to give his personal support to all areas of charity.

Monsignor Gallagher's talk was on "Poverty and its Implication to Catholic Charities." He first commended Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, Executive Director of the Elmira Agency, on her attitude that it is a privilege to serve in this capacity.

Mary Cuddy, Auburn, tuition scholarship in library science from Columbia University and the University of Chicago.

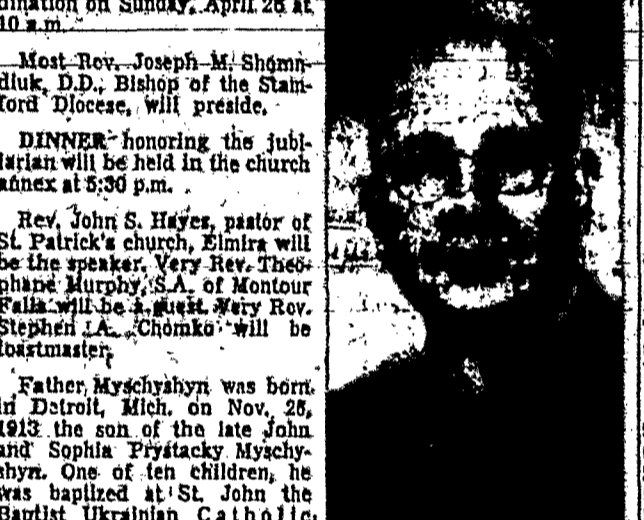
