

National Head Speaks On Family Life Role

Too many parents lack confidence in their ability to guide their growing children, said a veteran in the family life apostolate here last week. The Rev. Bertinelli, national moderator of the confraternity of Christian Mothers, spoke on "The Christian Mothers' Unit" at which Father Roll spoke in observing its 75th anniversary this year. "You parents have been at the front line of the battle of life — and you know far better than most what is best for them!"

FATHER ROLL spoke at a "Father's Night" dinner sponsored by the Holy Family Parish Unit of the Christian Mothers group last Thursday night.

"Parents are being pressured, cautioned and hurried to let their children do just what the youngsters want — and too often, the parents are giving in with a shrug and a 'What can you do?' he continued.

Fathers in particular are apt to evade their God-given roles as leaders and disciplinarians of their children. But when they face their role like men, the whole spirit of the family improves, the priest said.

"As far as dating customs, men are better judges of right and wrong than women. And as men, they know what immodest dress can do to the emotions of the boys their daughters go out with," he stressed.

Other points made by the Pittsburgh priest as he talked about common faults of parents were:

Temper — "There are times when it should be used. There are situations that call for a loud voice and an angry tone!"

Housekeeping perfectionists — "Homes are to be lived in, not just admired. If the children
