

Scholarships At St. Agnes High

Saint Agnes High School has awarded three full-tuition scholarships and eighteen partial scholarships to the incoming freshmen class, according to the announcement of Sister Marie Margaret, principal of St. Agnes.

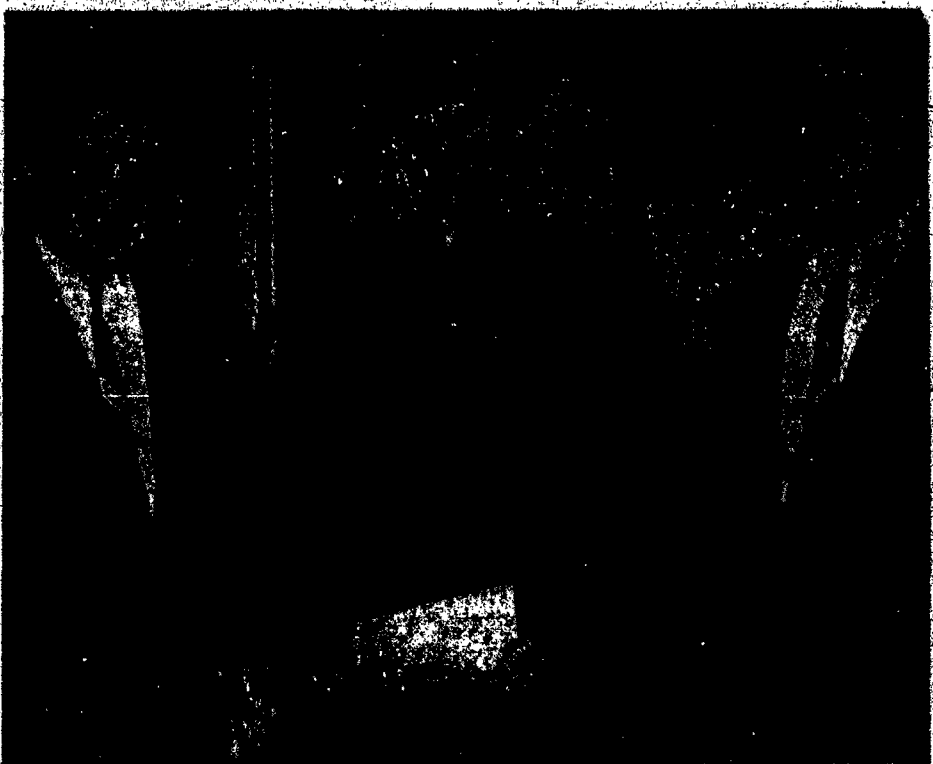
Full-tuition scholarships amount to \$225 a year; partial scholarships, \$100 a year. Each is renewable for the four years provided a 80% average and satisfactory character ratings are maintained each year.

Open House For Basilians

The Basilian House of Studies, 90 Fairport Rd., will open its doors to the public of the Rochester Diocese this Sunday, April 26 from 2 to 5 p.m. The cloister will be open as well as the chapel and recreational facilities so that the public may see where Basilian scholastics live, work and pray.

THE BASILIAN FATHERS, who staff St. John Fisher College and Aquinas Institute in Rochester, opened this third Basilian institution in the Rochester Diocese last September. The scholastics reside at the House of Studies during their four-year college course which is taken at St. John Fisher College. This is the only house in the Basilian congregation devoted exclusively to scholastics who are attending college. Similar units are planned for Windsor, Ontario in connection with the University of Windsor and in Houston, Texas in connection with the University of St. Thomas.

The pastor, Rev. E. A. Heyck, C.S.B., extends an invitation to the clergy, religious and laity of the Diocese to view the new buildings. The House of Studies may be reached from Fairport Road, first entrance west of the Eastern Expressway.

Fr. McMannus Slated In First Saturday Talk

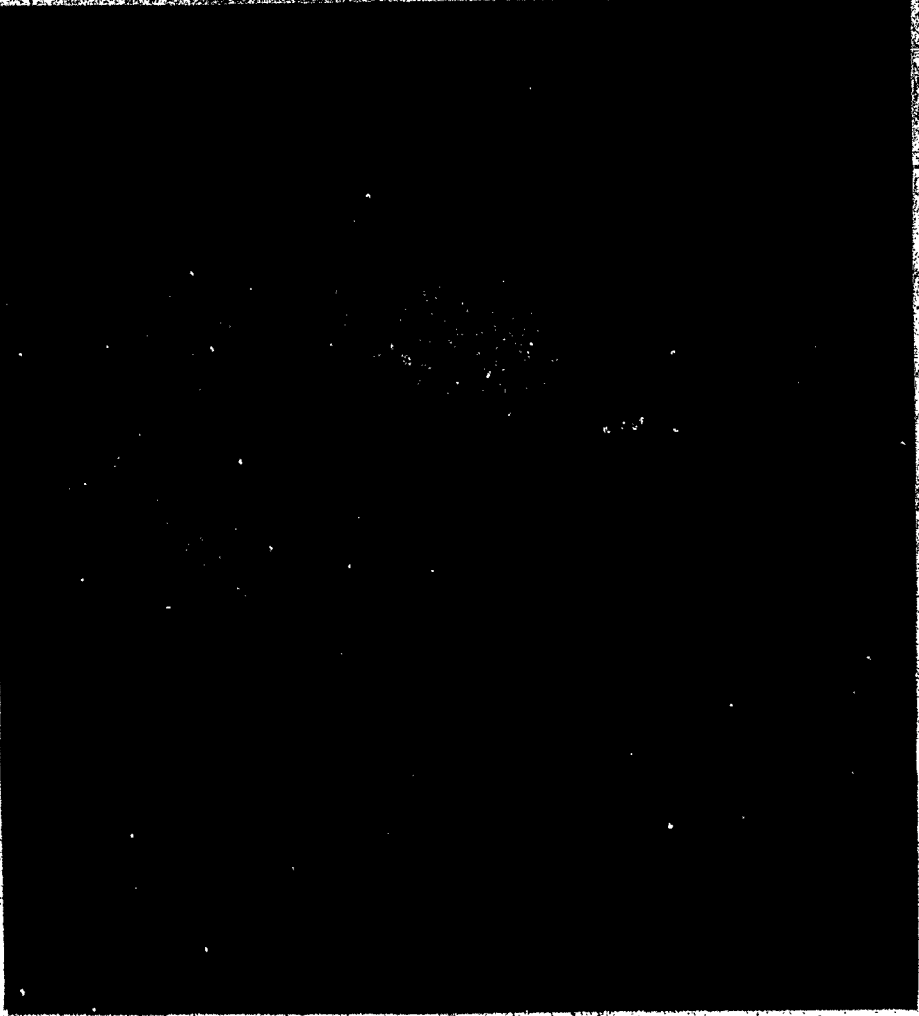

Local Thespians Join In Bard's Birthday

Perhaps the works of William Shakespeare are quoted from the penit more than any other source outside of Holy Scripture itself. And over the speaker's table, it cannot be contested that the Bard of Avon, not the Greeks, had a word for it.

Today the world celebrates the 400th anniversary of the birth of William Shakespeare in Stratford-on-Avon, England. That he was the world's greatest playwright is undisputed, and libraries have been filled with writings about his works.

THIS WEEKEND, Nazareth and Fisher colleges, as part of a Shakespeare Festival, will present a tribute to the playwright and his times, entitled "Dumb Shows and Noise." Queen Elizabeth and her court will view the "Dance of Death," "Noah's Deluge," "The Seven Deadly Sins," Morris dancing and many other entertainments of Shakespeare's period.

On Saturday evening at 8, the curtain will rise at Nazareth Academy for Blackfriars production of "The Taming of the Shrew." Under the direction of Wilford Scott, a large cast for the famed comedy is headed by Lionel Grell as Petruchio and Barbara Neely as Katharina. Settings were designed by Carl Zollo and costumes by Richard Mancini. Nancy Belanger is producer and Russell Scriber, stage manager.

This is the final presentation of the Shakespeare comedy which has been performed at Our Lady of Mercy High School and Notre Dame High School, Elmira. Tickets may be purchased from students or at the door.

IN ENGLAND this week, the British post office broke with tradition and placed Shakespeare's picture alongside Queen Elizabeth's on a series of commemorative stamps. Previously, illustrations on stamps were restricted to royalty.

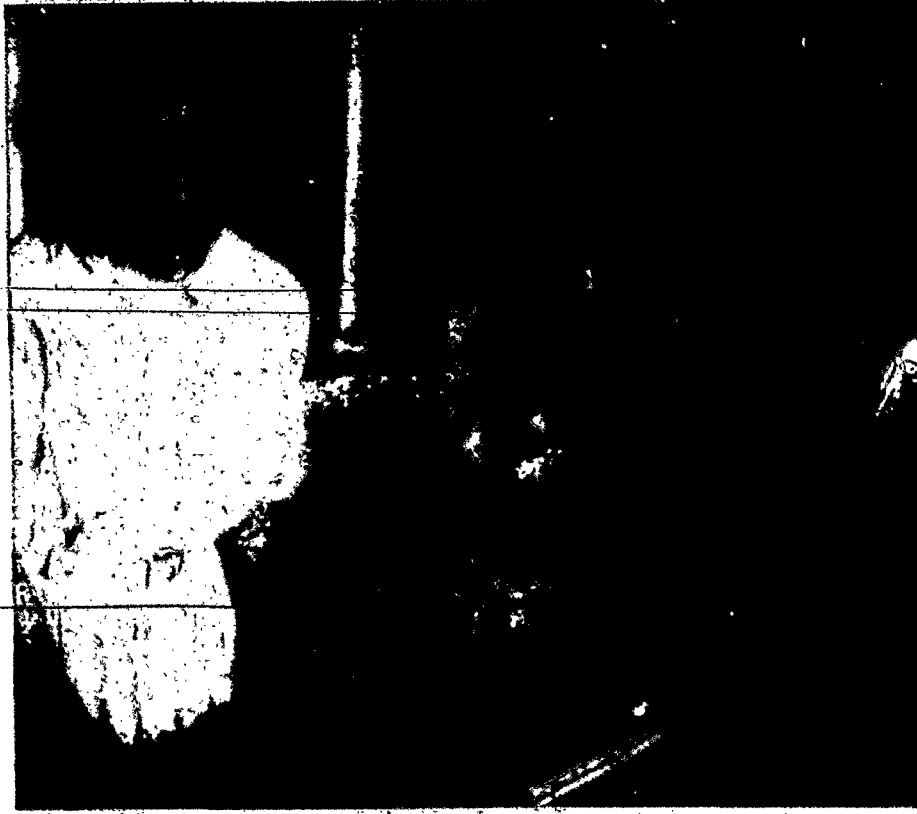
The influence of Shakespeare is perhaps epitomized in an NBC "special" this Sunday (WROC-TV at 10 p.m.) in which films of the places associated with his life and plays are featured. It is called "Shakespeare: Soul of an Age."

A monument in Stratford accused Shakespeare of having died a "papist" - whatever he was, the religious aspects of his work and their catholicity cannot be denied.

There are 400 "brief candles" on Will Shakespeare's birthday cake and an eternity of tributes.

A widely known preacher, Father Hohman has been heard in various churches and schools of the diocese. He assists at Sacred Heart Cathedral and takes his turn in preaching there.

Ordained Oct. 18, 1946 in St. Ambrose Church by Bishop Kearney, Father Hohman has served as assistant pastor at St. Helen's and Blessed Sacrament churches. He also was diocesan director at one time of the Diocesan Council of Catholic

Women and director of the Thanksgiving Clothing Drive. George J. Schenk is grand knight of Rochester K. of C. council sponsoring the luncheon and Raymond L. Nary is co-chairman.
