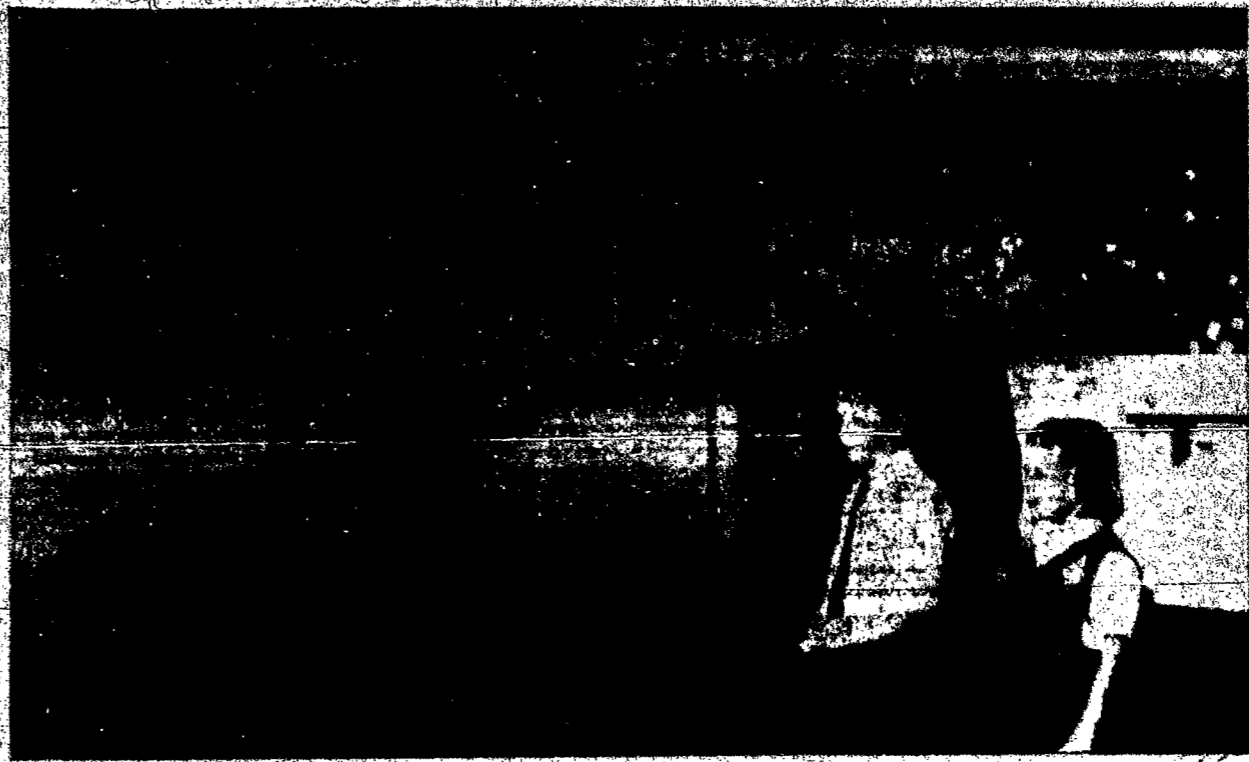


### Church, School Blessing Planned Sunday

## Canisteo Church Campaign Listed

Candidates—Proposed enlargement of St. Joachim's Church to increase seating capacity by 50 per cent was announced this week by the Rev. Vincent P. Collins, pastor of St. Joachim's and of St. Mary's Church, Rexville.

Parishioners of both churches will undertake fund-raising campaigns on Sunday, May 17. The St. Joachim drive will be for expansion funds, and the St. Mary's campaign will aim at an increase in weekly contributions.

FATHER COLLINS said present church includes a Meade addition to the rear of the St. Joachim's structure to provide new sanctuary space, allowing for conversion of the present sanctuary to added seating.

Erected in 1889, the red brick edifice seats 126 persons. The pastor said it is inadequate for many religious functions. Other aims of the St. Joachim campaign include reduction of debt and renovation of the parish catechetical facilities.

The St. Mary's drive will stress entire parish support in the one Sunday offering envelope, with elimination of extra parish collections and of other fund-raising activities.

Two of the girls already know where they will serve. Miss Marie will be assigned to Senegal, West Africa, and Miss Donahue to Tunisia, North Africa. The others have not received their assignments.

## St. Rita's Civics Club Given National Citation

## Diocese, Friars Schedule June Boys Retreats

The second annual vocation retreats sponsored by the Diocese of Rochester and the Graymorn Friars will be held at St. John's Seminary, Montour Falls from June 23 through June 29.

Announcement was made this week by Father Louis Hohman, diocesan director of vocations, S.A., rector of St. John's.

"The retreats will be restricted to boys with a serious interest in the priesthood and to those who will have finished at least the seventh grade by this time. Vocational retreats are designed to offer these boys a suitable atmosphere in which to consider their possible vocations. It will give the boys an opportunity to meet and talk to priests, to experience what a seminary is like and to talk to other boys who feel the same inclinations that they do," Father Murphy said.

He pointed out that both diocesan priests and Graymorn Friars will be the confessors of the retreat. "This," Father Murphy said, "will enable the boys to hear from both diocesan and religious priests what their respective vocations call for."
