Class B What a Way to Go

Objection: What could have been a light hearted comedy-satire becomes unacceptable because much of the costuming of the central character appears to have been chosen primarily for the purpose of stimulating prurient interest. High artistic purpose does not justify flagrant exhibitionism—even if only to ridicule it.

Note: This classification is applicable only to prints shown in the U.S.A.

Class C (Condemned) Molesters, The

Objection: Under the flimsy pretext of a documentary, whose purpose is to instruct parents to cooperate with police by reporting incidents of molestation, this film is, in fact, nothing but a sensational orgy portraying in explicit detail various sexual aberrations.
