Gerald Conroy Requiem, Veteran Auburn Organist

Auburn — Rt. Rev. Msgr. James D. Cuffney, V.F. pastor of St. Mary's Church, Auburn, was celebrant of the Solemn Requiem Mass offered in St. Mary's Church on Saturday, April 25th, for Mr. G. Gerald Conroy, organist and choir director at St. Mary's Church for thirty-seven years.

Mr. Conroy died at his home, 25 Charon Street, Auburn, on April 22, 1964. Born in Auburn, a life long member of St. Mary's Parish and graduate of its school, Mr. Conroy served as substitute organist at St. Mary's, after completion of his studies at Eastman School of Music. He began his duties as permanent organist and choir director on December 25, 1926, when the late Rev. John J. McGrath was pastor of St. Mary's.

He was teacher of music at St. Mary's School during all these years until he became ill on January 5, 1964. He served as organist, director of music for four of St. Mary's seven pastors.

Mr. Conroy was honored at a testimonial dinner on January 22, 1962 in observance of 25 years of service to St. Mary's parishioners and children of the school. During his years at the church and school, he directed and arranged the music for the children and parish societies entertainment. He was a member of Auburn Council, Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society of St. Mary's Church, and the Auburn Organist Association.

Monsignor Cuffney paid this tribute to him: "I am deeply grieved at the passing of 'Gerald'. His long and faithful service to St. Mary's Church and School deserve a just reward. He will be sorely missed and long remembered here. It is the end of an era at St. Mary's."

Mr. Conroy is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Nora C. Simmons and Mrs. George Bowen; three

brothers, Joseph F., James M. and Anthony J. Conroy; several nieces and nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews.

Monsignor Cuffney was assisted at Mass by Rev. John T. Walsh, deacon and Rev. James A. Williams, sub-deacon. Seated in the sanctuary during the Mass were: Rev. J. Norman Magrett, Rev. Charles I. Sullivan, Rev. Robert L. Kress, Rev. Raymond J. Wahl, Rev. Raymond Wuest. In the church were the Trustees of the church, the ushers, delegations from the Rosary and Scapular Society and the Holy Name Society and the Faculty and children of St. Mary's School.

Burial was in the family plot in St. Joseph's Cemetery. The committal prayer was read by Monsignor Cuffney, assisted by Fathers Williams, Magrett and Wuest.

More Housing For Elderly Urged

Washington—(NC)—It is time that Church groups paid more attention to the thousands of elderly persons living in sub-standard and dilapidated homes, the executive secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities said here.

For too long, said Msgr. Raymond J. Gallagher, Catholic dioceses and religious groups have been devoting their attention to the very sick and very aged in institutions, while the vast majority of elderly persons received little assistance.

In an interview during the two-day Interfaith Conference on Housing for Senior Citizens sponsored by the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency here, Msgr. Gallagher suggested that Church organizations give more thought to providing low-cost rentals for those persons struggling along on small incomes.

At the same time, he said present government regulations make it difficult for charitable groups to sponsor such housing by tying up large amounts of philanthropic funds in capital investments.

Msgr. Gallagher said government officials "showed a willingness to cooperate" in this area, and that "they would not oppose new legislation" to simplify some of the financial requirements.
