

## Progress In Human Rights Encouraging — But Uneven

(Notes from keynote address of James Egan at New York State Conference on Human Rights, Rochester, May 4, 1964.)  
It's easier for a Negro to become a Ph.D. than a plumber in New York City said the Vice-President of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in his keynote address to the New York State Conference on Human Rights held in Rochester last Monday.

Dr. James Egan made this point in stressing that the progress noted in human rights is encouraging, but uneven.

(Dr. Egan is well-known to many Rochester graduates of the College of St. Rochelle, where he taught for ten years.)

His speech, "A Community Audit in Human Relations," dealt with a number of key areas which he felt needed checking in every community. Among other salient points made by the speaker were:

**IN EDUCATION:** Administrators should assess the human relations attitudes of their teachers. Teacher-training is now beginning to come with this need.

Parents' groups: "Could do great work by analyzing the roots of prejudice in their meetings."

Mass media: "Are they giving an accurate account of progress being made in race relations, or only stressing the spectacular incidents that occur?"

Housing: "Too many people are giving lip-service to open housing, and then getting angry when they hear of a Negro family moving onto their street."

Employment practices: "Need some objective study. Some companies hire a single Negro woman, display her at a reception desk and then proclaim 'we've got an integrated staff here!'"

Dr. Egan felt that there is tremendous amount of good-will being shown in most communities, but it is too often poorly organized. Techniques are needed to get people actually involved in solving definite problems in their own areas.

"Volunteers are needed—in large numbers, but professional is human relations are needed too to help harness all the good-will in positive directions," he concluded.

The two-day conference was sponsored by the Webster Council on Human Relations.
