

Aquinas Relays List 20 Schools

The Aquinas Relays, set for May 25 at Fauver Stadium, appear to be a success already, even before the first race has been run. At least, successful as far as sheer numbers are concerned.

So far, 20 parochial schools have accepted invitations to participate and several others have expressed interest.

All Station V schools (public schools) have been invited to participate in special relays.

Teams from Rochester include Bishop Kearney, McQuaid Jesuit and Cardinal Mooney high schools and Aquinas. Buffalo area schools include St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute, Bishop Turner and Cardinal Dougherty high schools.

Sponsored by the Aquinas Alumni and under the direction of Rev. John J. Ward, C.S.B., track coach at Aquinas, the relays are expected to be the largest track event in upstate New York.

High schools from other parts of New York State include: Christian Brothers Academy, Syracuse; Mt. Carmel, Auburn; Notre Dame, Utica; Ascension, Walsh; Olean; DeSales, Geneva; Notre Dame, Batavia; St. Mary's, Lancaster; Bishop Duffy, Niagara Falls; Bishop Neumann, Williamsport; Cardinal O'Hara, Tonawanda; and St. Mary's Academy, Ogdensburg.

Although few relay carnivals are held in the Rochester area, they are very popular in other parts of the country.

According to Father Ware, relay running differs from the normal track meet. "To a sport normally limited to a runner contending alone against himself, the clock and the field, it brings strategy, psychology and team play," he said. "The relay puts teamwork into fast racing." Father Ware added.

Whole Mass in English

Put the whole Mass in English, not just part of it—that was one of the proposals made by the national bishops by delegates from 101 U.S. dioceses at a three-day meeting in Kansas City last week.

The delegates also proposed a national advisory committee on liturgical matters to assure uniformity in rites and texts throughout the country and a national institute of higher studies in pastoral theology.

ATTENDING the meeting from Rochester were Very Rev. Msgr. George Conzel, Rev. Benedict Ehmann and Rev. William Shannon.

The convention was held under the sponsorship of the National Liturgical Conference. Father Gerard S. Sloyan, conference president, told the 230 members present that all must work for an immediate practical implementation of the directives of the Vatican Council.

"Quite simply, the first 13 articles of the (liturgy) Constitution contain the new wine of the Gospel," he said. "If they are placed in the old leather bottles of unbiblical teaching, both theological and catechetical, they will burst them. We cannot go on serving two masters."
