

### Bishop's Fund Presented By K. of C. Units

Knights of Columbus councils and Fourth Degree assemblies in the Diocese of Rochester presented Bishop Kearney with various checks, Saturday night at a dinner in Hotel Sheraton for his use in advancing education in the diocese.

The affair is an annual one started about 10 years ago by affiliated units with the Central New York Chapter, K. of C. Raymond Glancy of Auburn, as chairman, over the years, opened the session Saturday.

Presentation was made by grand knights and faithful navigators summoned to the head table by Raymond L. Nary, master, fifth district, Fourth Degree who was toastmaster.

BISHOP KEARNEY in expressing his appreciation cited the knights for their aid to education on a national level and for their contribution to the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception at Washington. He said the local contributions will be used to assure a Catholic education for deserving students.

The Bishop also told of the formal dedication of the Vatican pavilion at the World's Fair. Cardinal Marolla likened the two lights of the pavilion chapel as beacons of world peace, he said, to the lights in the North Church heralded by Paul Reveré, a summons to war.

Honored guests also at the dinner were Rev. James Moynihan, secretary to Bishop Kearney; Rev. Roy Morphy, chaplain of St. John Fisher Council and Rev. John Steger, chaplain of Our Lady of the Cenacle Council and faithful friar, Fourth Degree.

John J. Kinney, past grand knight and former district deputy was cited for his work in arranging the dinner and handling the donations of the K. of C. units.

Bishop Kearney was announced as speaker for the annual banquet of Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union at the University Club by Miss Margaret Larkin, president. Miss Mary Skelly was listed as toastmistress.

The best Affirmative speaker award went to John Applebee of Cathedral Prep. and the Best Negative speaker was Mary Erickson of Mt. St. Mary's, Buffalo.

In the category of Original Oratory after three rounds of eliminations by six judges, Kevin Donovan of Aquinas was chosen as best speaker by Ann Klee, WROC-TV; Robert Kieve, WBBF; and Al Sisson, Lincoln Rochester Trust Co. Donovan spoke on the Civil Rights question. Thomas Traher of Cardinal Mooney captured second place.

Mayor Frank Lamb also spoke immediately before the banquet, at which the awards were presented.

With signing of the School Bus Transportation Bill, Chapter 485, by Governor Lehman, justice for all school children in New York State was assured according to a news dispatch from Albany.

"Let not your charity, then, be confined to words, it must manifest itself by the more unequivocal proofs of practical good of charity," Bishop Kearney said at Sacred Heart Cathedral at a Solemn High Mass for success of the Community Chest campaign.

### Kearney High Hosts Tourney

Bishop Kearney High School was the host on Saturday to the largest Freshman Debate Tournament in New York State. Sixteen schools from Rochester, Syracuse, Buffalo and New York City debated the 1964 debate topic.

Congressman Frank Horton spoke to the participants on the history and importance of debating and in the current debate on the Civil Rights question now before Congress. Congressman Horton told the students that we must remember that "brotherly love can not be legislated."

### Drive Kickoff In Canisteo

Plans for remodeling St. Joseph's Church include an addition to the rear of the building to provide new sanctuary and sacristy facilities, thus effecting a 50 per cent increase in the present 120-person seating capacity.

More than 70 women of both churches who recently completed a parish census will join campaign committees at the kickoff dinner.
