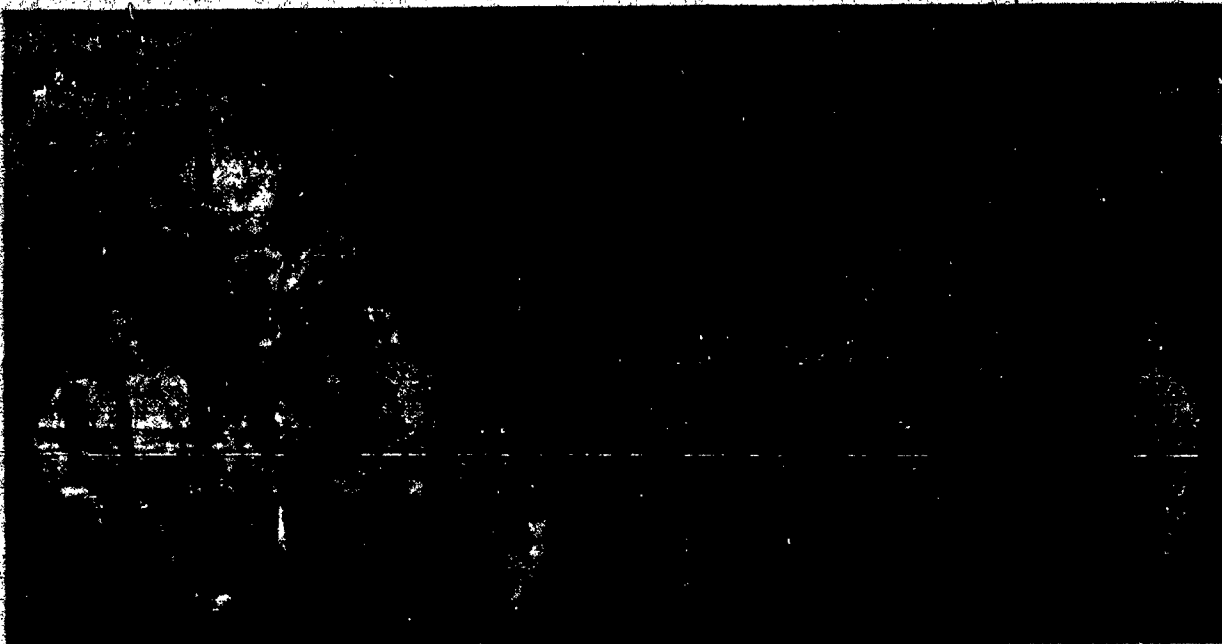

GOD LOVE YOU!

This letter is typical of those that come from our mission bishops who are working in countries where the Communist are beginning to devastate lands and to remove the Christian religion.

As a matter of fact, it is very difficult for the propagation of the holy Faith at this time, a more than 200 parish where the godless Communists are reigning, religion is slowly forbidden. The Catholics were told not to go to Church, to catechism, class or to say prayers. The Communist told them that all these things are useless to the fatherland. One of my priests had to leave his three parishes under the threat of death. The two catechists and two Sisters tried to stay, but were finally forced to leave. God save the poor sheep they left behind, for they are now converts! Another priest got out of his parish where he was constantly invited to attend Communist meetings. His three parishes are in the middle of the jungle occupied by the enemies of God's Holy Name. For the last year, non-tour in the most remote parts of my diocese I had to travel incognito to be able to avoid Communist attacks. I was almost arrested by the violent waves which swept the trail-craft packed with passengers of all ages. Thank God we were safe and sound, but the sacred vestments were soaked through. The hardships never scare my priests, never, who need and desire continued assistance in order to carry on joyfully their sacrifices for the greater glory of God and the salvation of souls.

May the bishops and priests of the United States, who fall upon this letter hasten to make sacrifices that we may forward it to the Holy Father for this bishop and many other bishops of the Church who are poor. To the Holy Father, we send our appeal, inasmuch as you are the brothers and sisters of the converts mentioned in this letter. St. Paul tells us that if the members of the Church suffer, the whole Church suffers. This is true of our physical body when, if our faith (the Holy Spirit) whole organism seems to share the pain. May our Catholic people translate week after week their love of the suffering, afflicted Church throughout the world, and do some act of self-denial for the Holy Father and his Society for the Propagation of the Faith.
