Object: Entertaining to be the history of the changing make of love through the ages. This film combines accepted classical art and pornography in such a way that it frequently becomes an obscene display of sex. Moreover, the treatment given to Christian teaching on love is not only lamentably inadequate but also at times offensive.

Weekend

Object: Although an effort at a serious portrayal of the emptiness of a segment of Dan's middle-class society, this film in treatment, exploits sexual perversion, sometimes to the point of pornography.

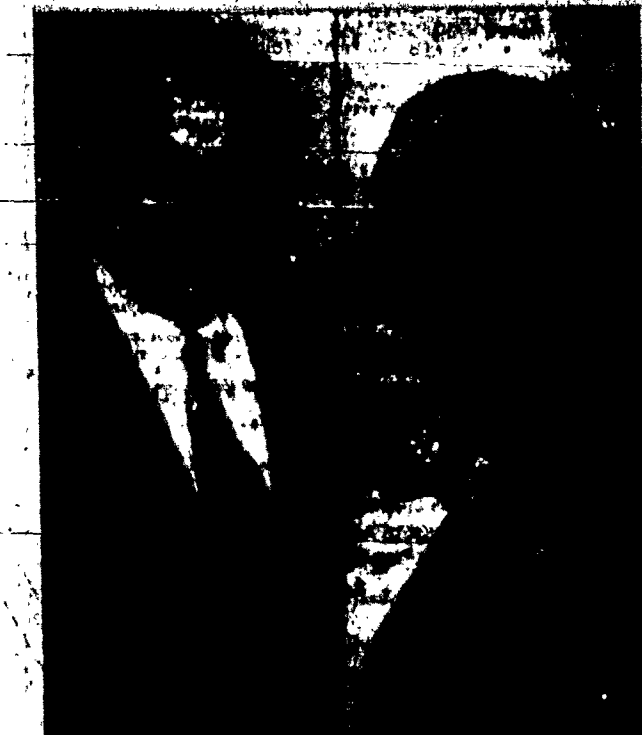
