and at Catholic University, Washington, D.C., and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Edmund Gibbons, in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany, June 3, 1939.

The following day Father Bertrand celebrated his First Mass in the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Rochester.

Father Bertrand spent the first six years of his priesthood as a professor at Trenton Catholic High School, Trenton, New Jersey. In 1946 he was among the first seven Conventual Franciscans to volunteer for the Order's newly accepted mission in Costa Rica.

From 1948 until 1960 Father Bertrand served as pastor and superior of the mission territories of Golfito and Quepos and prefect of discipline at the Conventual Franciscan Seminary, San Antonio de Belen.

From 1960 to 1963 he was Commissary Provincial of all the Friars Inhabiting in Costa Rica. He now is superior and novice master at the St. Joseph College of the Assumption, Alajuela, where nine native Costa Rican Friars are presently preparing to enter the Order.

Since Father Bertrand's arrival in Costa Rica eighteen years ago, the Conventual Franciscans have established and maintain five parochial mission territories which include over one hundred thousand souls, a high school and grammar school for eight hundred boys, a minor seminary with an enrollment of seventy-one boys, a novitiate, and a radio station.

There are now twenty seven priests and three brothers laboring in Costa Rica from the Immaculate Conception Province, whose motherhouse is located in Syracuse. In the past eighteen years four native Costa Ricans have been ordained Conventual Franciscan Priests, fourteen are presently studying philosophy and theology in the United States and nine are in the novitiate in Costa Rica.

The vocation director for the Conventual Franciscans for the Immaculate Conception Province resides at the Franciscan Mission House, 319 36th Street, Union City, New Jersey.

Aquinas Captures Elmira Relays

A flock of records fell as expected Saturday in the Elmira Relays and the happy faces bursting across the finish line were Aquinas Institute runners for the most part.

Aquinas won the meet comfortably with 22 points. Runner-up McQuaid Jesuit, also of Rochester, finished with 12 points, edging out Elmira Free Academy which tied Thaca High school with 10 points each.

And so Aquinas' collection of gold medals continues to grow. With Randy Block running as anchor man in the 800 relay, the Irish set a new meet record of 1:33 in the event. It was one of the four new meet marks produced by Aquinas during the afternoon. Aquinas also tied another and set a new school record, to boot.

Before the glory parade continues, it should be pointed out that McQuaid won the mile medley and set a new record. Eric Kendrick ran a 1:57.4 anchor 800 to help his team defeat Waverly. Elmira Free Academy captured the 400-yard shuttle hurdles; Southside took the distance medley and Geneva won the 400-yard event.

Aquinas broke records in the half-mile, mile and two-mile events to its fourth victory in the last six years of competition in the highly respected Southern Tier meet.

On Saturday, May 23, Aquinas will be host for the first annual Aquinas Relays, set for Fauver Stadium of the University of Rochester.

McQuaid Runs Second; Records Fall, Anyway

For the second week in a row, Aquinas and McQuaid were one-two against out-of-town opposition, with the Knights taking runner-up spot behind the Little Irish at the 13th annual Elmira Relays last Friday. That cozy arrangement may not have anyone exactly doing cartwheels around the Elmwood Ave. campus, but it has produced a substantial rewriting of the McQuaid record book. And further deprecations against the surviving standards can be expected when the Knights and the Irish go at it again in the Aquinas Relays this Saturday and in next Wednesday's dual meet at McQuaid.

In the next race, McQuaid's two-mile foursome of Greg Sloan, Paul Jones, Mike Shaughnessy, and Pete Millon though far off Aquinas' winning pace averaged under 2:13 apiece to lower the school mark to 8:51.2.

Gold medals went with the next record, as Kendrick out-dug his Irish opponent in a 1:57.9 half-mile anchor leg that carried McQuaid's mile medley team to a school and meet record of 3:42.7. It was the first time under two minutes for Kendrick, who began his leg in fourth position, some 35 yards off the pace. He caught up gradually, then battled stride for stride down the backstretch before finally taking the lead at the last turn. Keeping him in the race for his prime effort were Mike LaForce, Tom Melich, and Derek Melich, all timed in 22.7 for his 226 leg.

The evening started auspiciously, with senior Pete Gores coming up with a 14.6 anchor leg to bring the Knights home second in the 400-yard hurdle shuttle race. A school record 58.7 clocking went with the silver medals, shared by Gores, Steve Borbas, Bert DiPolo, and Dave Dunn.
