THE HOLY LAND: HUNGER

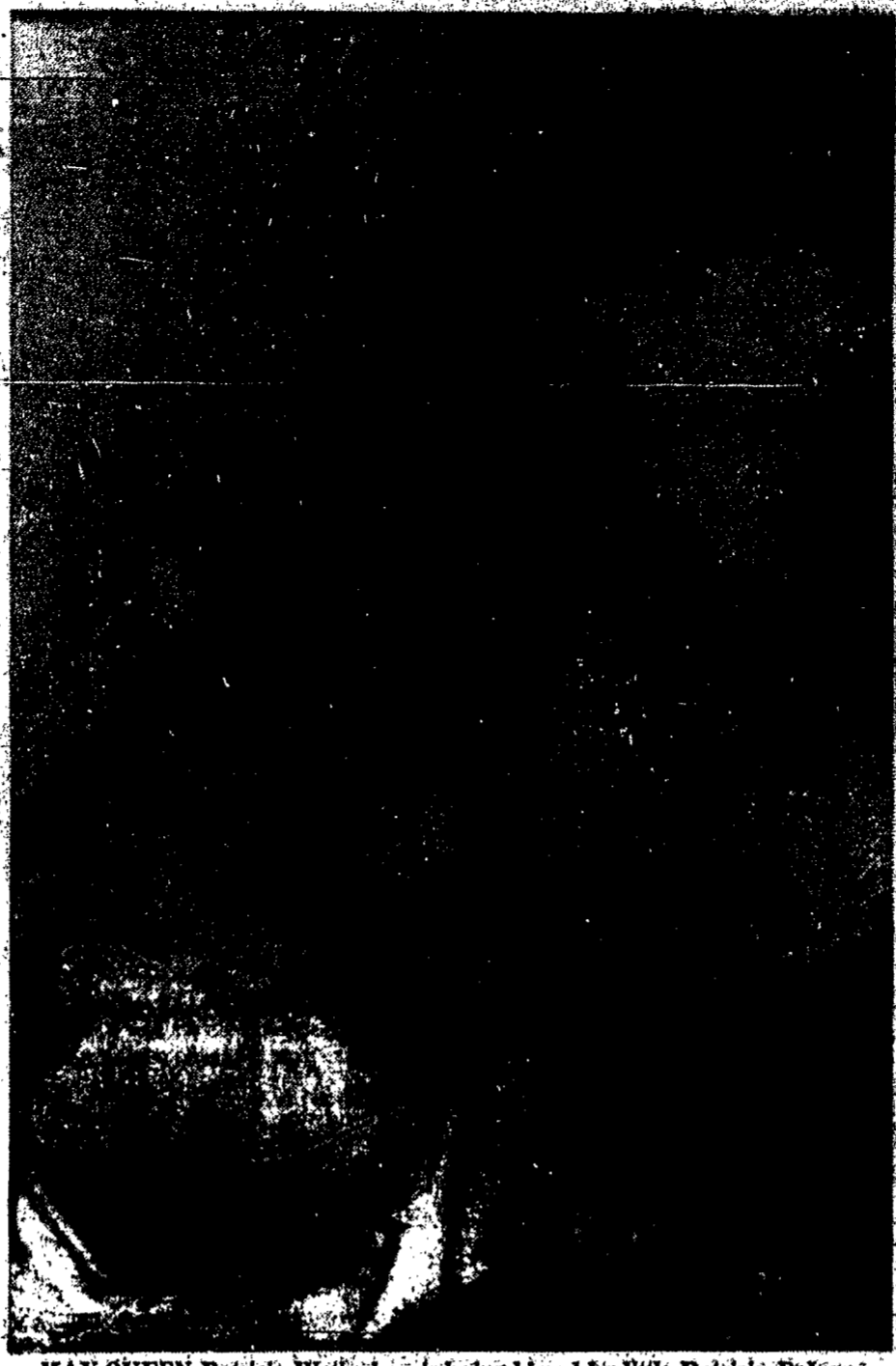

Welcomed By
Valor Legion**

Rev. Elmer W. Heindl, DSC, a priest of the Diocese of Rochester was welcomed into the Legion of Valor according to General Orders, Legion of Valor, April 1964, official publication.

FATHER HEINDL, an Army chaplain in World War II received the Distinguished Service Cross for his extraordinary heroism with the 27th Division in the Philippines in 1945.

Detailing the priest's heroism under fire the Legion of Valor said: "Chaplain Heindl proved himself worthy of the highest tradition of the church and of his military service."

The Legion of Valor comprises wearers of the Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross and the Navy Cross.

Father Heindl who is pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Cato and St. Thomas, Red Creek also wears the Silver Star, the Bronze Star Medal with V for Valor and the Presidential Citations of the United States and the Republic of the Philippines.

Currently, he serves as Chaplain of the 27th Division, U.S. Army Reserve, and holds the rank of Lieutenant colonel.

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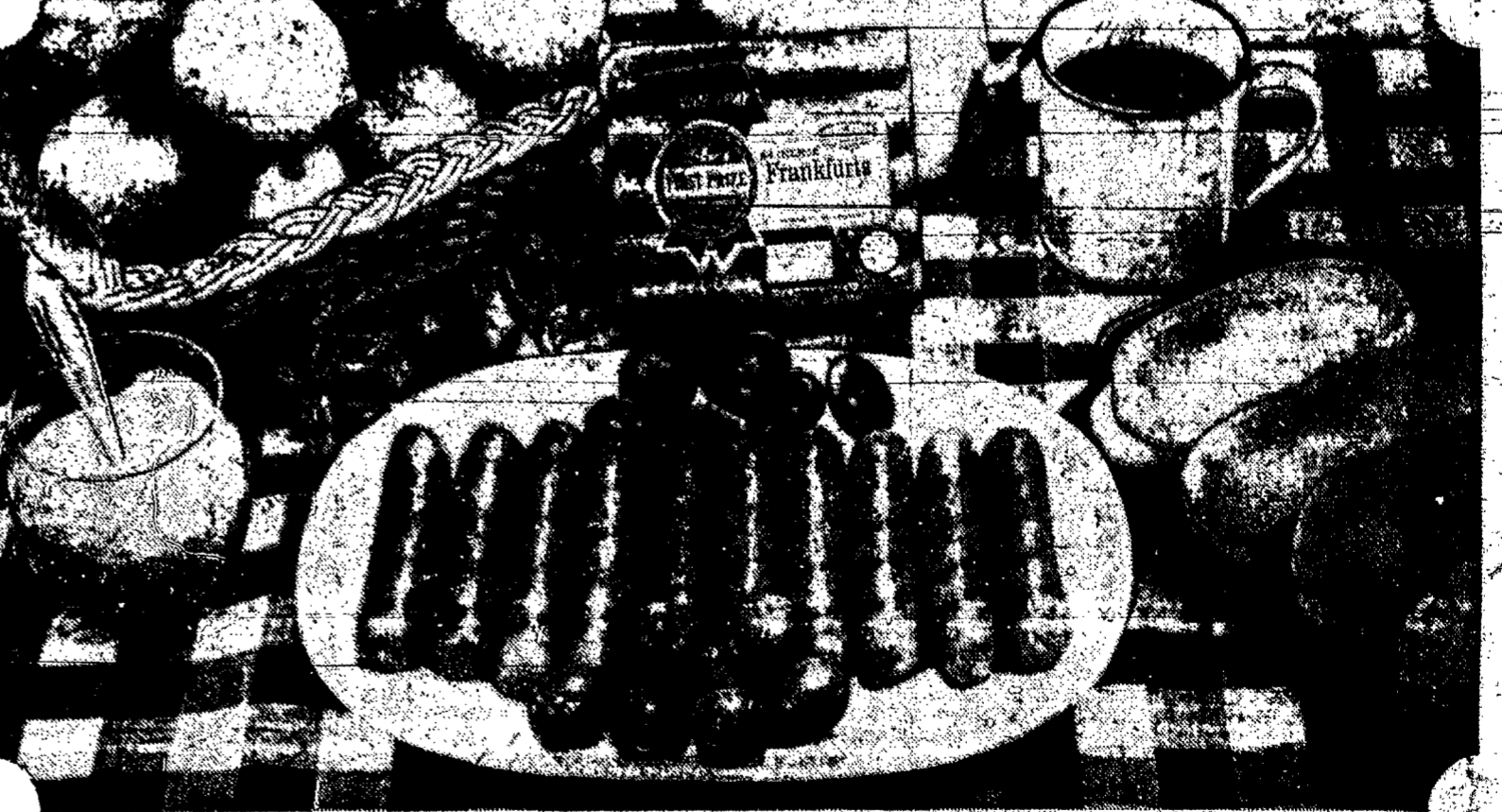
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
