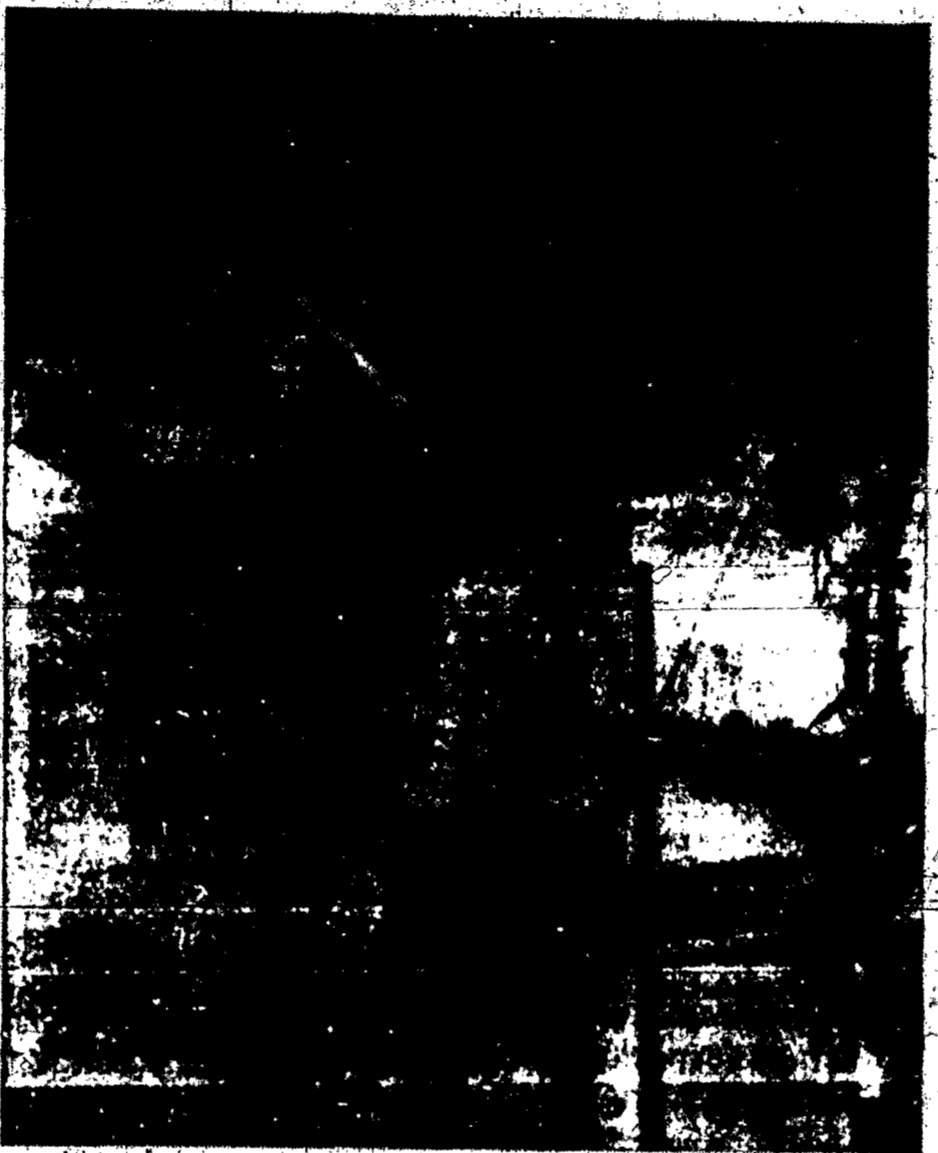

Aquinas Student Wins State Honor

Stanley Jakubaszek, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Jakubaszek of 205 Duran Street, Rochester, was one of the top six winners of the New York State Science Congress sponsored by the Science Teachers Association of New York State at Corning, May 15-16.

Stanley was also one of the top three winners of the Regional Science Congress which was held at Brockport April 13, and at the Rochester Museum of Arts and Sciences April 24.

He has been chosen to represent the Central Western Zone of the Science Teachers Association at the New York State Exposition at Syracuse, August 31 to September 7.

In earning top honors at the State Science Congress at Corning, Stanley competed against the thirty-five best science projects selected from the entire State. The competitors at this Congress represent the top science leaders in the high schools of New York State.

The nature of Stanley's work, however, goes far beyond the mere winning of state honors in science fairs. He is credited for making "a positive contribution to current medical research in the field of neuro-surgery."

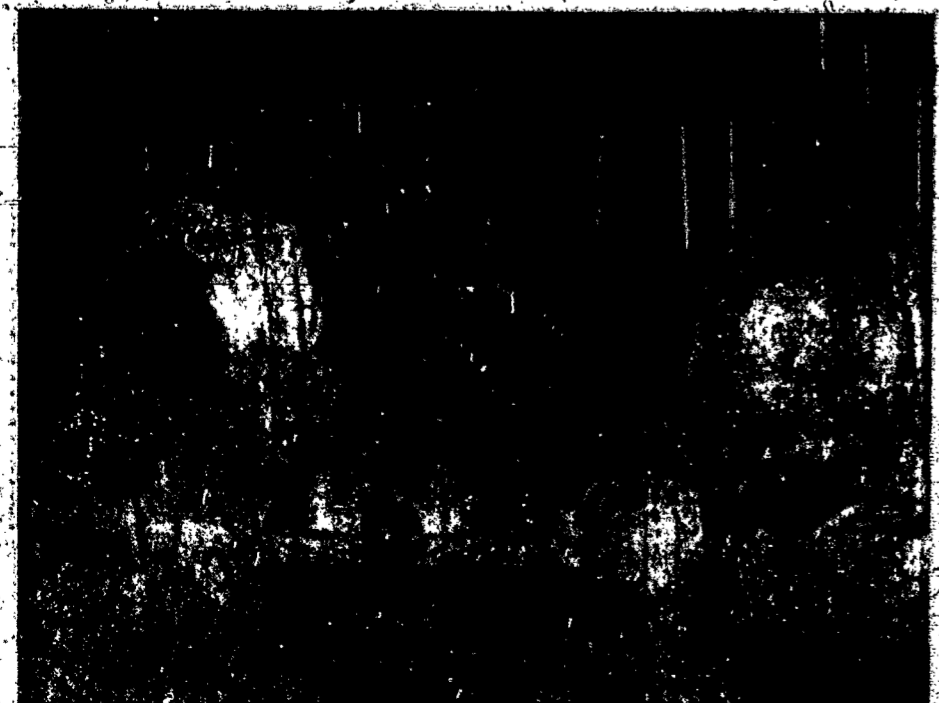
At the suggestion of the authorities of the Roswell Park Memorial Institute, world renowned cancer research institute directed by the Graduate School of the New York State University at Buffalo, Stanley developed an improved technique for inducing cerebral hypothermia.

His research, entitled "Localized Cerebral Hypothermia by Ventricular Perfusion," proved the feasibility of the procedure which is now being perfected for use on human subjects. Doctors at several medical centers have expressed amazement that so thorough a piece of research could be done by a high school student.

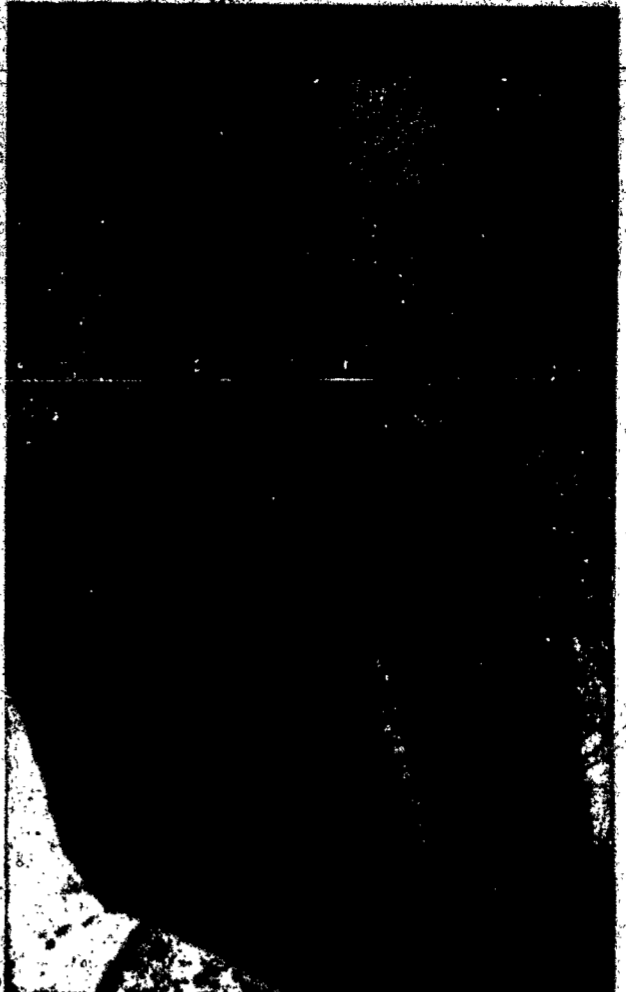
He earned credit for Regents high school biology when still an eighth grader by attending summer school on his own initiative.

Subsequently he was instructed in the principles of electrocardiography and related subjects by being tutored for one year at the Strong Memorial Hospital by Dr. Richard Tobin. He was then awarded a National Foundation grant to attend the Roswell Park Memorial Institute.

Five of the winners at the Regional Science Congress and the State Science Congress came from Catholic high schools, including Sally Schreiber of Our Lady of Mercy High School who won a silver medal for her outstanding mathematical project entitled "Imaginary Graphs."

Golden Jubilees For Two Priests

Two veteran priests of the Rochester Diocese will observe their golden jubilees in the priesthood next week.

They are Rt. Rev. Msgr. George J. Schmitt, pastor of Holy Family Church, Rochester, and Rev. James T. Wood, now at St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, and former pastor for 29 years of Assumption Church, Fairport.

Both were ordained by Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, Rochester's second bishop, in old St. Patrick's Cathedral, June 6, 1914.

Monsignor Schmitt will mark his anniversary at a solemn Mass in Holy Family Church, Sunday, June 14, at 5 p.m. Bishop Kearney will preach the jubilee sermon. Rev. Robert Ranka will be deacon and Rev. Bernard Gross, subdeacon. No reception is planned.

Father Wood will observe his jubilee privately at St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell.

Following are brief biographies of the two jubiliants:



Father James Wood

Monsignor Schmitt, born Oct. 21, 1886, the son of the late John and Anna Eiber Schmitt of Rochester, attended St. Peter and Paul's school, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. Following ordination in 1914, he was assigned as assistant pastor at St. Boniface Church.

He was founder and first pastor of St. Anne's Church from 1930 to 1950. Church, school, convent and rectory were built during his pastorate and then a new school in 1948. The original St. Anne's Church now serves as parish church for St. Lawrence parish in the Town of Greece and has been replaced by the recently completed new St. Anne's Church.

Monsignor Schmitt also served at that time as chaplain to students at the University of Rochester and was widely known for his interest in theatrical productions.

He was named pastor of Holy Family Church in 1950 and has redeveloped the church and renovated parish properties since.

that time. He personally donated the main altar as a memorial to his parents. Pope John XXIII made him a domestic prelate with the title Right Reverend Monsignor in 1959.

Father Wood, born May 30, 1887, the son of Charles and Anna Ball Wood of Mumford, attended Caledonia High School, St. Charles College, Catonsville, Md., and St. Bernard's Seminary.

After his ordination in 1914 he was assigned as curate at Corpus Christi Church, Rochester, and in 1918 was named chaplain at the New York State Agricultural and Mechanical School at Industry. The following year he became Catholic chaplain at the Craig Colony, Sonoma.

He was named pastor of Assumption Church, Fairport, in 1925 where he served for more than a quarter of a century until failing health forced his retirement from pastoral duties in 1954.

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
