At our house, it seems, we are not alone in our transportation problem. Cars, as necessary for 1964 urban and suburban transportation in the U.S.A. as the car is in other parts of the world, are a major headache. They are, at least, to the owners. To the youngsters they are merely wheels — to take them places and see things.

What the oldtimers fear about these people, the younguns, is this: they have become so dependent on wheels they may lose the use of their limbs. They use their legs merely to get them in and out of cars, to walk from the curbs to the entranceways of homes and places of entertainment, to school and to church.

It was Anita Loos, celebrated author of the novel and hit musical "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes," who came forth with the observation that in South foot for transportation is sought by the police using his own California "any citizen pact."

IN AN ARTICLE published in the current Harpors, Miss Loos cites the case of the late Aldous Huxley, noted British author, who one even went out for a stroll in Beverly Hills. He was stopped by two policemen. They wanted to know what this strange character was up to, walking the streets, of all things. Mr. Huxley's reply that he was merely taking the air did not quite convince the officers. They ordered him to get off the sidewalk at once, get going and keep going, or they would call the addywagon and haul him to the police station, under arrest.

This prevails not only in California, seemingly, but in many other parts of the country as well. Is this what we are coming to in all sections? Only a few men, and hardly any women, including the younger set, do any walking at all. There never seems time for it, and certainly not the inclination. It seems to be the influence of two forces, automation and, to coin a word for it, automobilization.

"Give her the gun" is the slogan of the times. "Get behind a wheel, and let's go!" It's fun.

The formula has been translated into: never walk when you can drive a car; never drive a car when you can get a plane and strike for the bright blue yonder. Never, if possible, get in a plane that is not a jet.

This is the age of mobility, automobilization, mainly. The latest statistics are out now. They show that America before 1964 is ended will have an additional 8-million brand new cars on the streets and highways. This is what makes for a higher economy.

Mrs. Peter Mahler was matron of honor and bridesmaids were Miss Eileen O'Brien and Miss Sue Embree.

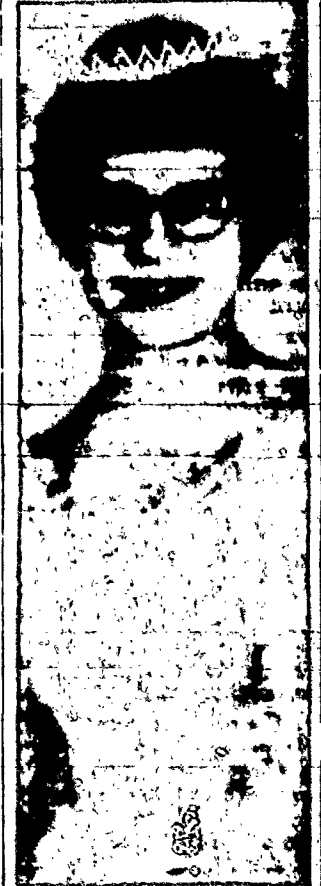
Robert Alaimo was best man and ushers were Roy DeFord and Leland Masters.

Roy Gamble, O.F.M., at the annual Interfaith Communion Breakfast held recently in Rochester, opened up a new awareness of the racial situation and the Christian's duty toward it and started a socially letter-writing project aimed at Congress.

The Junior and senior Socialists at Mercy discussed the racial crisis at a recent meeting and were particularly concerned with the CORE demonstrations held at the World Fair. The question, "What do Christians think of the racial situation?" was pondered thoroughly.

Socialists at Mercy are taking a positive approach to the problem as a result of Father Gamble's talk at a school Socially Unit meeting, and a Diocesan Socially Denary Meeting on the same subject.

Father aided in his talk that many Congressmen were receiving mail with a very large percentage opposing the Civil Rights Bill. Socialists, feeling that this is a basically good bill and wanting their Congressmen to know their sentiments, have taken on the project of writing letters to their Congressmen, telling them that they favor and support the bill.
