Space Exhibit At Museum

Four major program areas of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration are shown in the display "Photography From Five Years of Space" at Rochester Museum of Arts and Sciences through June 28 in the special exhibition gallery on the second floor.

The first five years of activity are depicted in scenes of manned space flight, space sciences, applications and advanced research and technology.

There are 94 color and monochrome photographs in the display. Each provides information in visual form that will add to a better understanding of United States space science and technology.

The exhibit is a collection of outstanding prints made by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Life, New York Times and National Geographic photographers. Photographs were selected by Allan Gould of the American Society of Magazine Photographers; George James of New York Times and Maurice H. Louis and A.C. Sumner of Life and Associates, respectively, of the Photographic Society of America. The pictures were chosen for their strong human appeal and lasting documentary value—unforgettable people and events recorded for posterity by the camera.

Rockets, satellites, Saturn assembly line, Mercury escape system test, the Astronauts, recovery of the astronauts are among the exciting scenes covering a span of five years of space science in America.

Geneva—Ray Marks, scoutmaster from Rome to the Vatican Pavilion at the New York World's Fair, was one of five persons in the Rochester Diocese who were honored at the Bishop's Dinner recently in St. Ambrose Church, Rochester.

Mr. Marks received the St. George Award for outstanding service to boyhood. The award was presented by Bishop Kearney at St. Ambrose Church in Rochester.

Mr. Marks has been a scoutmaster for nearly nine years. He is a member of the Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Rochester Diocese. He served as instructor on numerous Finger Lakes Council training courses and was the recipient of the Scouters' award in 1960. At present he is a member of Troop 5's committee.

Besides being active in White Springs Volunteer Fire Company and president of Kiwanis Club, he is a member of St. Stephen's Club. He is recognized as an outstanding Catholic Scoutmaster in the Finger Lakes Council.

Others who have received this award in the Council are John R. Davis, Geneva, and Louis F. Laude and Carl W. Stone of Seneca Falls.

Mr. Marks was one of five in the Rochester Diocese honored by the bishop.

Another feature of the program was the address by Bishop Kearney in which he shared with the men present the extensive arrangements and details necessary in order to get Michelangelo's "Pieta" moved.

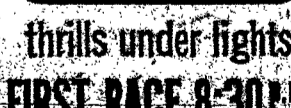
