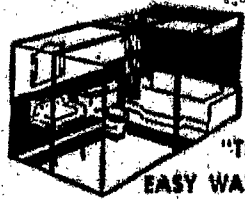

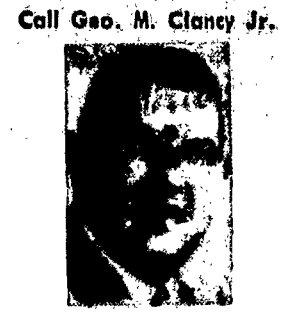

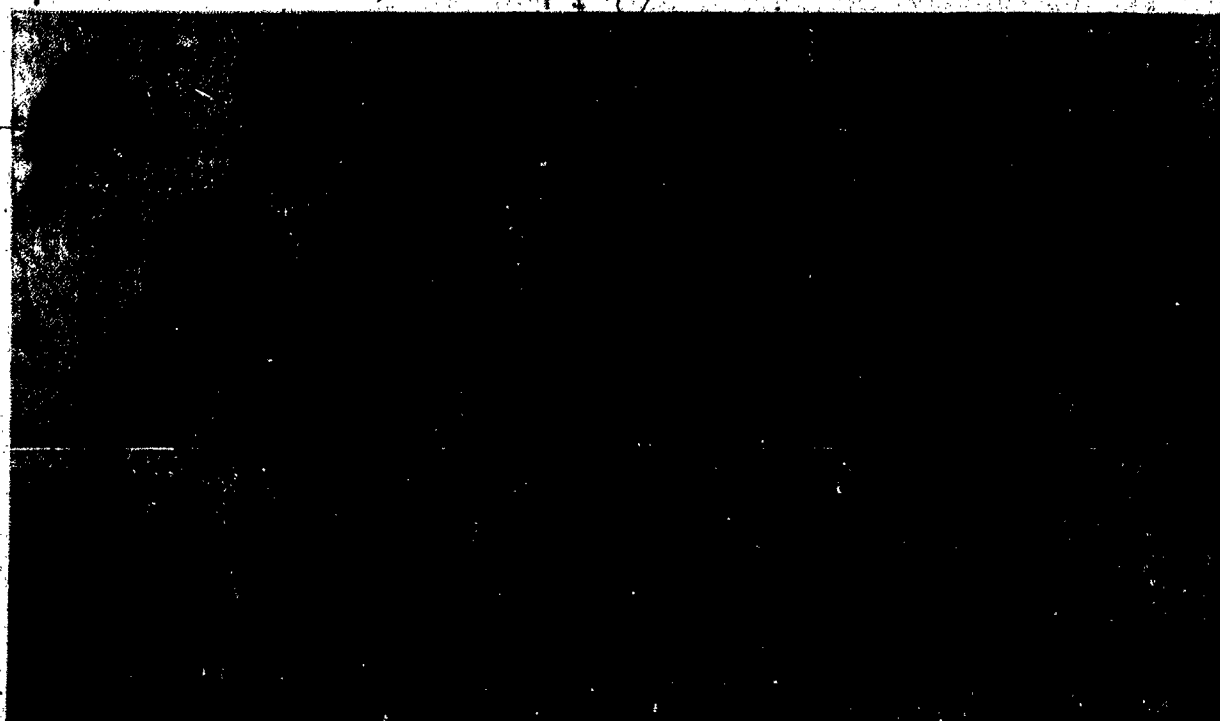
Pilgrimage Set

Inter-Faith Committee Formed In Auburn

Auburn—Clergy of the Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Jewish and a major part of the Protestant faiths have announced the formation of a permanent Inter-Faith Committee for Auburn and surrounding area.

THE PURPOSE of the group is to help the mayor and city council and the city at large in the assistance of all major religious groups in matters affecting the common good.

Secondly, by its own initiative to proclaim the oneness of the religious community on social issues and other matters of common concern.

Although the interest is not limited to Civil Rights, they are concerned with the peaceable and orderly resolving of inter-faith problems as they present by either side or may arise in the future.

Judo Tourney Scheduled At Mooney High

Cardinal Mooney High School gym will be the site of the first all Catholic High School Judo tournament ever held in New York State on Tuesday, May 28 at 7:30 p.m.

THE TEAMS participating in the first annual event consist of students from St. Andrew's Seminary, Aquinas Institute, Moquin Jesuit High School and Cardinal Mooney high school who will act as host.

Judo will become an Olympic Sport for the first time this year when the games commence in Japan where Dr. Kano developed the art of throwing an opponent in 1882.

The area students began the practice of this international sport last October under the instruction of the members of the Rochester Metropolitan Judo Club which expects over 150 students to enroll in the new course for students attending the Rochester Catholic high schools in September.

An added attraction will be a demonstration in the art of Karate by the Tsuka Karate Club of Rochester.

Tickets may be purchased at the door for 50 per adult and 25 per student.
