## Scouts Retreat Slated

It was announced this week by Rev. Roger Switzer, Chaplain of Catholic Scouts in the Sullivan Trail Council, Elmira, that a special religious retreat campout scheduled will be held June 20 and 21 for all scouts now holding the Ad Altare Dei award. In addition, scouts now completing the requirements for the religious award are to attend the retreat to be held at the Waverly Monastery.

THE PURPOSE of the Ad Altare Dei Award is to encourage the Catholic boy in scouting to advance in religion and in the service to God, and to help the scout live his faith and law. The award does not in any way take the place of the scout awards.

The award affords the scout the opportunity for closer guidance from his pastor or Catholic scout chaplain. The Ad Altare Dei Award is presented in church with the authority of, and usually by the ordinary or bishop of the diocese.

It is administered through the diocesan scout committee. Although the award is supervised by the Church, the Boy Scout movement, through the national and local councils, has given it full support since its inception in 1941.

The Sullivan Trail Catholic Committee on Scouting has arranged for this first retreat campout. Committee Chairman, Arthur F. Lisner, requested that all scouts eligible to take part in this retreat should contact him at RE 0-3408. A limit of 40 scouts must be made. A fee of \$2 per scout is required to cover the expenses involved. Scouts do not have to supply food. Tents will be provided for the campout.

The entire weekend atmosphere will be one of reverence. The scouts will attend religious sessions starting promptly at 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 20. A program will be carried out by Father Switzer with the cooperation of the Waverly Monastery.

To maintain the spirit of the retreat scouts will not be expected to set up tents nor to prepare their meals. This work will be done by adult leaders.

All scouts attending the retreat are expected to provide their own transportation to and from the Monastery. Time of arrival on June 20 for check-in is 9 a.m. The necessary fee should be paid at that time.

A special religious poster patch will be awarded to scouts who have completed the retreat.

On Sunday, June 24, the Ad Altare Dei Award will be made to the new scouts who have fulfilled the requirements for the award.

The presentation was made on behalf of the company by T. Keener, manager of the Elmira District for the firm.
