Vatican Radio said that in speaking of the "unjust expulsion," Pope Paul VI had expressed the hope that the Sudanese authorities would realize they had made a mistake and remedy it.

The Pope, it said, had declared that the Holy See would be most willing to discuss the matter, but "so far no approach has been made by the Sudanese authorities."
