**Swimming Program Set At Neighborhood Sites**

Swimming programs for boys and girls, ages five and up, will be conducted this summer in fifteen privately owned outdoor swimming pools and registrations are now being accepted for these classes. Instruction is to be offered at all skill levels with particular emphasis given to non-swimmers.

Classes are limited in size to insure the best possible teaching conditions and all lessons are to be taught by qualified American Red Cross Water Safety instructors and aides. At the conclusion of each eight lesson course, students receive signed progression cards and swim suit badges in recognition of the progress made.

**SPECIAL ADULT** classes are also to be conducted at various locations for non-swimmers as well as for those requiring instruction in more advanced phases of swimming and diving. The purpose of this program is to make swimming instruction and the knowledge of the elements of water safety readily accessible by offering such training at neighborhood sites.

**Fr. Callahan Marks Jubilee In Priesthood**

Father John T. Callahan, well known to many Rochester area residents, recently marked his silver jubilee in the priesthood.

He celebrated his jubilee Mass at the Church of the Holy Canadian Martyrs, Combermere, Ontario. Bishop William J. Smith of Pembroke presided at the Mass and gave the sermon.

Father Callahan is chaplain at Combermere's Madonna House, actually a village which includes a chapel, two farms, library, shops and several houses — all of which make the setting for a "university" of the lay apostolate.

Founded in 1943 by American newspaperman Eddie Doherty and his wife, a Russian refugee, the Baroness Catherine de Hueck, Madonna House attracts hundreds annually to its indoctrination courses.

Father Callahan, prior to serving as chaplain there, was chaplain at Mercy Motherhouse and High School, Rochester, and curia at Sacred Heart Cathedral and St. Augustine Church.

**C.Y.O. In The News**

This summer, the Catholic Youth Organization will conduct four different day camps throughout Rochester. The day camps will be located at the downtown C.Y.O., St. Andrew's Parish, 623 Portland Ave., St. Augustine's Parish, 410 Chilli Ave., and Holy Apostles' Parish, Lyell Avenue.

All but the downtown camp will run from July 6 through August 28, 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. The downtown C.Y.O. day camp will start June 22 and end August 28.

A highly qualified staff has been hired this year to run the different day camps, and many new and exciting activities are planned for the camping season. Some of the activities will include swimming at the C.Y.O. pool, a softball league between the camps, cookouts, hikes, a day camp olympics among all camps, and many arts and crafts.

Registration fee of all the camps is \$5.00, which covers the cost of the camp insurance, a camp T-shirt and a camp hat. The camp fee is \$9.00 per week, \$16.00 for a two week period. If a camper registers for 4 weeks, the fee is then \$27.00, plus registration. If the child registers for the entire 8 week camping session, the fee is then \$48.00, plus the \$5.00 registration fee. The age of the campers will be from 6 to 13 years of age.

**Counsel Seen Divorce Cure**

Detroit — (NC) — A judge said someday "we will arrive at the ideal situation" when a divorce suit simply will state, discord threatens a marriage and the parties are in need of marriage counseling.

Circuit Court Judge Victor Baum, longtime advocate of compulsory marriage counseling as a means of cutting down the rising divorce rate, told the annual banquet of Wayne University's Law Review staff present divorce proceedings bring about family breakups unnecessarily.

Under the present system, he said, one married partner files suit while the marriage is in an acute stage and there is no provision for counseling in an attempt to save the marriage.

I am 35 years old and I do feel the pain of being poor, but not in the same way as the people you mention in your columns. I gave me some time ago. It has great sentimental value, but I want to show the unfortunate of Asia and Africa that they have friends who want to help them. That there are people who care."
