The 440 relay mark was broken in Batavia in mid-season with a 44.7 time. Handling the baton for the winners were Aquinas' Steve Sillick, Craig Zorvay, Tom Guerinet, and Randy Block.

Dick Mitrano set a new record in the shot put by uncorking a 49-foot toss; Lou Spillotti established the school record by throwing the discus 124-feet, 9-inches. The event is new this year.

Operating on the theory that plenty of potential gold-medal winners are to be found in the ranks of the freshmen, Father Ware stages a three-session practice every afternoon.

He starts the freshman off then tends to the junior varsity and winds up with the varsity. He tunes-up for these chores by teaching a full Latin program.

Looking Back K.C., Masons Fellowship Dates Back 25 Years

Knights of Columbus and Masons spent an "evening of good fellowship" together in St. Dominic Parish, Northfield, Minn., a release of the NCWC News Service, said this week.

The item furnished an occasion for a look back at other days in this area when these groups met for a similar purpose. Immediately flashed across the memory screen, the first Knights of Columbus Shrine baseball promotion at Reg. Wing stadium in August, 1939 when Joseph (Stubby) Flynn, then grand knight called the first game and parent program, "A Natural."

The ball game was between Buffalo and Rochester with the Buffalo manager, Steve O'Neill, a Knight of Columbus, against the Red Wings.

Prior to the main attraction was a softball game between the Shrine old-timers and the Knights once-warens. Score was never recorded for posterity.

The Shrine were headed by their Potentate Martin W. Utz. Working with him on the committee were Fred Evans, Harry H. Frank, Elmer Rathel, still a familiar figure on East Avenue, and "energetic" Roy R. Rumpff. The K of C committee comprised Dr. Walter B. O'Neill, Paul Predmore, Leo Rombaut and Otto A. Shultz.

Glamour and color were lent by fraternal and national guard units, bands, drum majors and drum corps.

Proceeds went to charitable programs of each of the groups. The next year it was tried again on August 29. Babe Ruth and Mrs. Ruth were honored guests and the Babe performed with his famous swings at the plate. Joe Flynn was again grand knight but the Shrine was led by Potentate Fred W. Evans.

The Knights of St. John and Ladies Auxiliary drill companies led by Col. Fredrick J. Wegman joined the Shrine drill corps and the knights in the military pageant. I remember, "us knights" wore summer tuxedos and a green tie which I still have, the tie not the suit, which had to go back to A.J. Tux Shop.

Handling details were Frank M. Beaucote, Frank H. Biel, J. Herbert Kaebler, Leo McGreal, Dr. Walter B. O'Neill, Paul A. Predmore, William T. Price, A. Elmer Rathel, Leo F. Rombaut, Col. Arthur S. Smith, Martin W. Utz, Commander-William Zimmerman, Roy Rumpff, secretary and Otto Shultz, treasurer.

When the Shrine conducted its annual trip to Cobourg via 88 Ontario, Grand Knight Flynn was invited as guest. As grand knight of the K. C. Council in 1942, this writer attended, marched in the parade in Cobourg and addressed the welcoming crowd. Later John J. Kinney as grand knight attended with Past Grand Knight Flynn.

Many friendships with individual members of the Damascus Temple were made by the knights. On the boat trip are recalled Carl Ade, Rufus Hodges and many more.

The ball games and boat trips were not the first meeting of the two groups. When John A. Doyle was grand knight, he and officers of Rochester Council attended a welcoming reception for Fletcher D. Smith, of Rochester, elected as Imperial Potentate of the Shrine, the national leader.

Other recollections include speaking at an Odd-Fellow state convention session in old Convention hall, hearing of knights at the Jewish Young Men's Association dinner in a Community Chest program.

"And then there's"—as Morgan Beatty would say on NBC the "good fellowship" engendered between two groups, which led to the formation of the K of C in Rochester for many years had intimate ties. This is the recollection of members of Muss Caravan, Order of the Alhambra attending Divine Liturgy at St. Joseph's and receiving Holy Communion with men of that parish. This program was fostered by William Tatyka of the Ukrainian parish with the late Father Nicholas Wolensky and the present Father Stephen Chomko.

On further reading of the news story from Minnesota, it is told how cooperation of free men, not governmental coercion, is needed today to solve major problems of society.

While the get-together there was of a social nature, State Supreme Court Justice Robert J. Sherman injected the serious note for such gatherings today. He told the group that "the major problems of our times, will be solved by men who cooperate with one another even though they have basic differences of opinion."

Governmental institutions cannot provide answers to major problems, he said, because unlike communist governments which can wield a power which arises from the inherent efficiency of dictatorship, the U.S. is committed to the doctrine that we must achieve consensus of opinion by persuasion.

He said, however, the "U.S. must achieve action for the common good by the spontaneous outgrowth of right-minded men exercising free will."
