

AOH State Conclave Slated For Elmira

Final details in the plans are being worked out for the Hibernian State Convention scheduled for Elmira later this month. Some 700 Hibernians from all corners of the State will gather for their 72nd Biennial State Convention, June 24 to June 27.

THE STATE meeting will open officially with the Solemn Convention Mass, Thursday morning, June 24 at 9:30 in St. Patrick's Church.

Delegates will start registering Wednesday afternoon at Convention Headquarters, the Mark Twain Hotel. State and National officers will arrive in Elmira on Tuesday.

For the first time in its 128-year history, a resident of New York State—Judge James J. Comerford of New York City—is National President of the Hibernians.

Judge Comerford will be in Elmira, along with the State President, William Kinane of Brooklyn.

Convention Chairman Matthew F. Fennell and Mrs. Jane C. Coggins, Ladies' Chairman, have scheduled a final pre-convention general meeting for

all Chemung County Hibernians for Saturday night, June 20.

Plans will also be discussed at a meeting of the Mgr. John Lee Division, Friday night, June 12. Division President John R. Battersby will preside.

The opening Solemn Convention Mass will be celebrated by the Very Rev. Donald M. O'Callaghan, O. Carm., Prior Provincial of New York City. Father O'Callaghan is State Chaplain of both the New York State Board, Ancient Order of Hibernians, and its Ladies' Auxiliary, and Deputy National Chaplain.

The National Chaplain is Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York City.

A Communion Breakfast will be held at the hotel following the opening Mass.

The Convention will close Saturday night with a Banquet and installation of new State officers, at the hotel.
