

McQuaid Ends Season With .718 Mark

All four of McQuaid Jesuit High's varsity teams posted winning records in the recently-concluded spring season, with the aggregate of 28 wins, 11 losses, and 1 tie amounting to a victory percentage of .718.

The McQuaid golfers went 8-1, the tennis team 6-1, the track men 7-4, and the baseball squad 7-5.

A loss to Aquinas in the diocesan tournament, later avenged in a dual match, was the only setback suffered by Father William McBride's golfers. Senior Mark McConville, Frank Morrell, and Dick DeJell were either medalists or leading contenders all season, as the Knights came up with close wins over Brighton, Pittsford, and Aquinas to highlight their season.

In tennis, Brighton tagged the Knights with their only loss and battled them to a tie in a second match. A highlight was the season-ending 3-2 win over county division leader Earl Edge. Seniors Mike Hallock, Joe Conellan, Mike Mulligan, and a greatly improved Jack Marin were the bulwarks of the squad, with junior Pat Trib, soph Dave Mullins, and freshman Chris Scharf providing solid support.

Track and field saw the Knights come along after dropping their first two meets. Their hopes of upsetting unbeaten Aquinas went by the boards in a late-season 89-49 dual meet loss, but 12 new records and numerous relay awards kept the team largely on the plus side. With sophomore Eric Kendrick, Chuck Maier, and Bryan Burns, and junior Paul Sadler leading the way, McQuaid's underclassmen accounted for 11 most three-quarters of the season's

points, a bright indicator for the future.

Kendrick, beaten only in the broad jump against Aquinas, broke two minutes for his last three 800 efforts of the season, all of them in relay meets. His 1:57.7 anchor leg at the Aquinas Relay provided one of the new records, a 3:40.3 clocking for the mile medley relay.

Seniors Tom Meisch and Pat Gores were runners-up to Kendrick in the scoring parade, combining for over 115 points and giving McQuaid some much-needed strength in the dashes. Gores left two hurdles records behind him, breaking both the 120- and 330 marks. Other season providing substantial points totals were hurdler Steve Swobas, high jumper Kevin Cullane, and distance men Mike Connor and Mike Shaughnessy.

Season-ending highlights against Canastota were Kendrick's 105 hurdles, Meisch's 4:45 mile in his first try at that distance, hurdler Dave Dunn's win in the quarter, also in his first try, and Dick Lehard's lowering of his two-mile record to 10:33.5, some 42 seconds under his best time of last season.

The baseball season ended, as might be expected, with senior Dave Celmer on the mound for the Knights in a close ball game at Batavia. Celmer won it, 3-2, making his record 7-2 and tying him with Jim Jones of the 91 team for most wins in a season. His remarkable statistics included 5 shutouts, 3 one-hitters, and 3 5-hitters. He pitched 61 innings, struck out 87, and yielded only 6 runs on 18 hits. For sheer consistency, he was the best around.

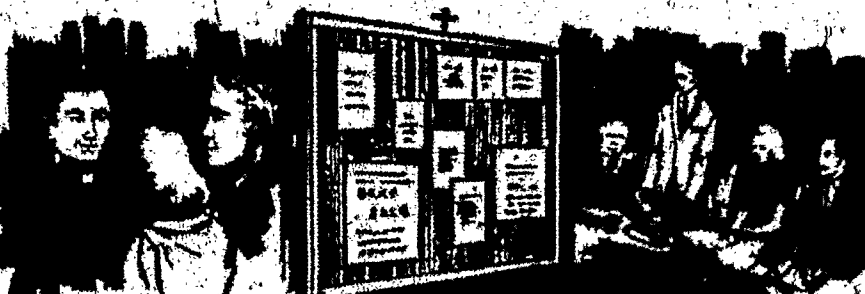

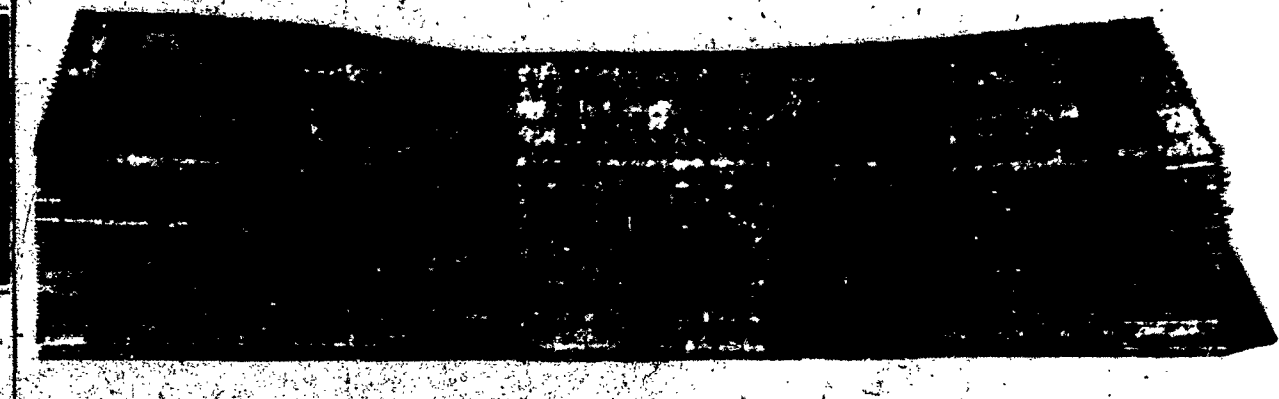
