Reception, Profession Rites At Nazareth Motherhouse

Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence E. Casey, presided at ceremonies of reception and perpetual profession held in Nazareth Motherhouse Chapel Saturday morning, June 27, when 31 young women received the habit of the Sisters of Saint Joseph, and 26 young religious pronounced final vows.

THE CEREMONY began with the procession into the chapel of the postulants dressed in traditional attire, and the Sisters who had completed seven years of novitiate and juniate training.

Knelling at the altar rail, the postulants ritually asked for the habit and were questioned by the Bishop as to the sincerity of their intention and their realization of the manner of life they sought. Satisfied with their earnest desire and urgent consent, the Bishop blessed the habits, veils, rosaries and cinctures.

These items were carried by the attendants who preceded the brides as they left the chapel to be clothed in the habit.

The postulants were replaced at the altar rail by the Sisters who were to pronounce their perpetual vows. Individually, they recited the formula of profession, vowing "perpetual poverty, chastity and obedience, in the congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph."

The Bishop, with a special prayer, then presented each Sister to the altar and pronounced the sacred crucifix which she will wear as a sign of her espousals to Christ.

Following the profession ceremony, the newly-clothed postulants re-entered the chapel, knelt at the altar rail, and were

given the names by which they will be known in religion.

Very Rev. Chester Nowicki, S.V.D., was named Rector of Divine Word Seminary, Conesus, N.Y., to succeed Rev. Walter Joyce, S.V.D., who becomes Master of

BORN IN 1919, Father Nowicki entered Divine Word Seminary, East Troy, Wis., in 1934. After his novitiate, he made his Major Seminary studies at Techy, Illinois where he was ordained in 1948. Soon after ordination, his personal charm and popularity with young boys made him a natural with them, and he was appointed head Prefect of the seminarians at East Troy, Wis.

After two years in that position, he returned to Techy as Prefect of the young Brother Candidates, which position he held until 1958 when he was named Rector of the Major Seminary at Techy.

Since Conesus is primarily the novitiate for seminarians and the novitiate for Brothers—the formative years before the Major Seminary—that seminary is fortunate in this new appointment of Father Nowicki as its Rector, the announcing party said.

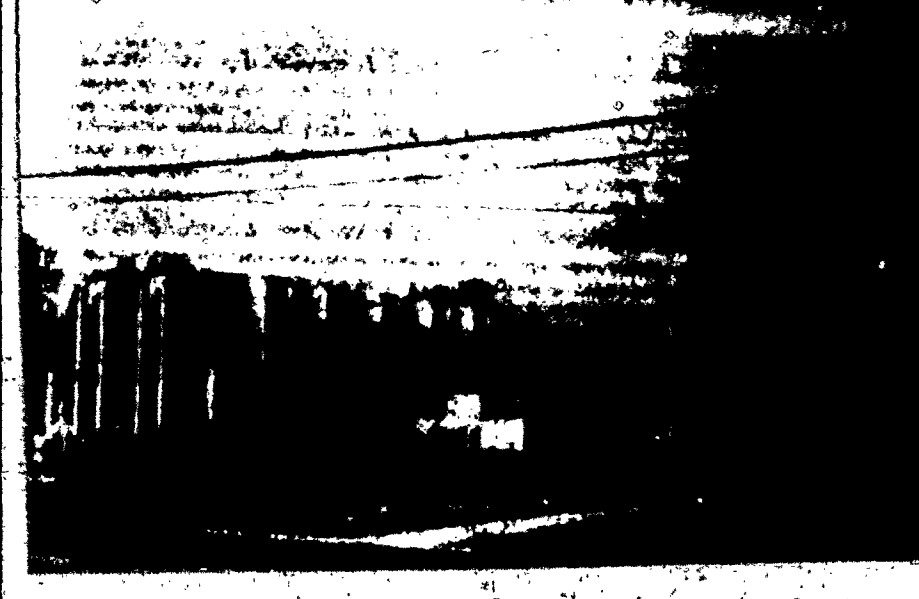

Aquinas Eyes National Band Title

In the first big splash of color at Aquinas Stadium, this summer, eight expertly drilled and highly uniformed drum corps will step out from the starting line at the beautiful Ridgeway Avenue stadium on Saturday, July 4.

It will be a brilliant and spectacular competition for the highest honors and richest prizes in the area.

IT'S THE DATE of the North American Drum Corps Contest, a show-down contest featuring top senior corps, sponsored by the Aquinas Institute Marching Band and the United Drum Corps.

Proceeds from the contest will enable the Aquinas Band, currently New York State Champions, to compete in a national band championship in Cleveland on August 23.

The much heralded Kelly Raiders from Philadelphia head the roster of competing corps which has been drawn from three Eastern states, Massachusetts, New York and Pennsylvania. The Raiders are past national U.D.C. and American Legion champions.

Eyeing honors also are such superb units as the colorful Marksmen from Springfield, Mass.; the pride of Long Island, the Sunrises; and two spectacular outfits from central New York State. The last are the flashy Geneva Appleknockers and the crackerjack Syracuse Brigadiers.

So strong is the competition that any one of the corps might receive the coveted North American crown.

Exhibition units will include the Aquinas Band, the Fardee Pacers, the fast stepping Statesmen and the Alpine Girls, the sweethearts of the drum corps world.

The date of the tremendous spectacle is next Saturday, the fourth of July. General admission seats at \$1.50 and reserved seats at \$2.00 will be available on that date at Aquinas Stadium. Children's tickets are available at 75c. Tickets may be purchased in advance at J.C. Penney's stores or from Aquinas Band members.
