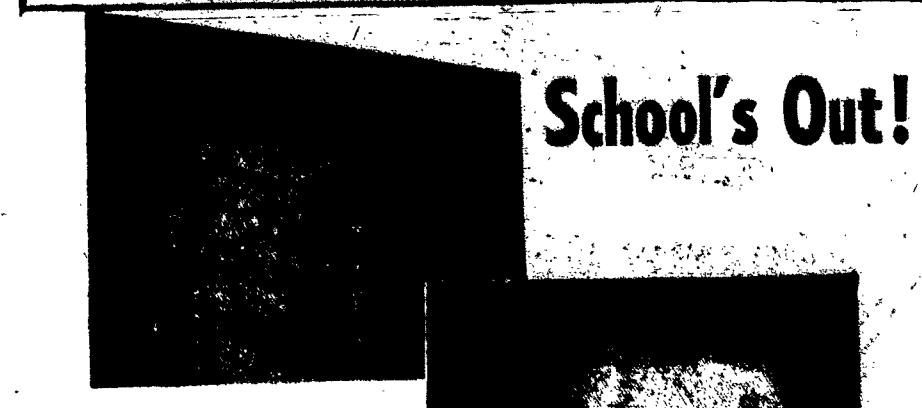

However, we hope there will also be great emphasis on swimming since this is the one sport that exercises and tones every muscle of the body. And as if there weren't reasons enough, the new bathing suits are, when well chosen, very attractive and flattering. But before taking the plunge, may I suggest you try on that new bathing suit in front of a mirror. View yourself both going and coming. If the reflection leaves something to be desired, EXERCISE!

The right exercise will not only improve your silhouette but will develop the loveliest, long, slender swimming muscles. Florence Chadwick, famous channel swimmer and all-time champion suggests some simple exercises which are the best physical fitness program that swimmers or non-swimmers could embark upon. When Miss Chadwick is in training, she walks at least three miles a day. It's just as good for us who are not in training, too. So in or out of competition, walk at a brisk pace on a flat beach. Not uphill or up steps because this tightens the muscles and the ideal is to keep them loose and flexible. For back and stomach muscles, note the two illustrations. Instructions below:

**FOR BACK AND STOMACH MUSCLES:** a) Take a good stance with feet spread wide. Keeping the knees straight, touch finger tips to opposite foot, swinging from side to side. Continue as long as you like. b) S-T-R-E-T-C-H arms straight up. Then touch the ground with your finger tips or the flat of your hand if you can make it. Keep the knees straight. Repeat and repeat. To develop a good leg kick, Florence Chadwick's exercise is to hold on something for balance. . . . like your beach umbrella. With knee straight but relaxed, kick from the thigh (not from the knee) forward and back eight times with each leg. Keep it up longer if you feel like it and your time allows.
