

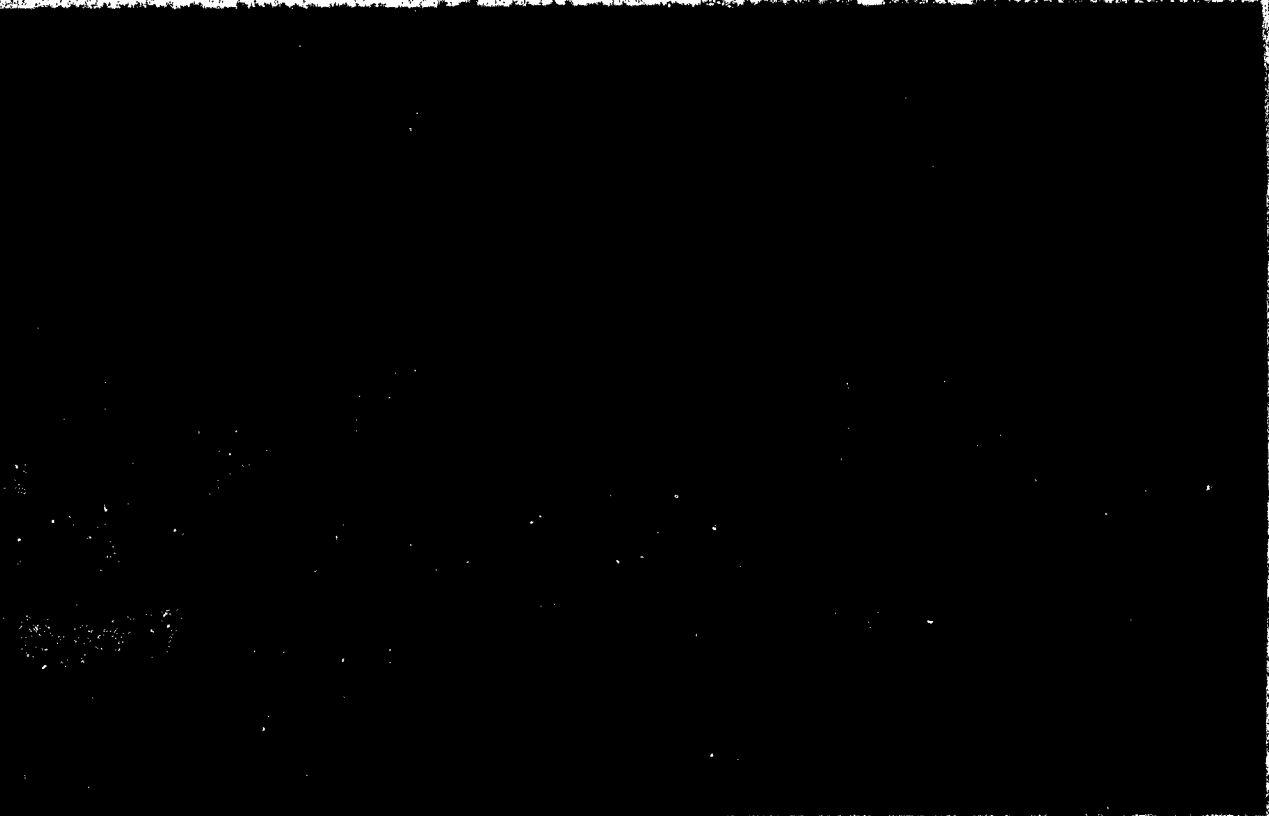
Arthur Miller Requiem Offered

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Nazareth College Grads Begin Careers At Home

Rochester Chamber of Commerce takes note: local college girls seem to be more anxious than ever to begin their careers at home—and they are being joined by an increasing number of their classmates who come from outside the Rochester area.

At least that's the case with the recent graduating class of Nazareth College. Over half of the class that graduated May 31, will remain in the Rochester area.

Even more surprising, 23 out of 58 out-of-town students elected to establish residence in the area.

THE LARGEST single group of graduates will work in Rochester area schools, half in the

city and half in the county. Others will serve as social workers, nurses, research assistants, and in various capacities in business and industry.

Some examples: Virginia Welch of Webster will work at the University of Rochester computer center; Janice Socker, Alden, will be employed in the Tax Department of Security Trust Company; May Ann, Ammanville-Hudson, and Sheila Smyth will stay on at Nazareth—Mary in the Registrar's office, Sheila as a library trainee. And no less than six graduates: Anne Collins, Anna Holland, June Keschering, Mary McCarthy, Mary Schaff, and Phyllis Steve, will join Eastman Kodak Company.

In addition, twenty-five of the class of 191 will go on to graduate schools, roughly half of them on scholarships and assistantships and four girls have been accepted for Peace Corps duty.

At last count, 17 seniors will go abroad for the summer.

Gary, 15, of 78 Silver St. described by his post advisor as a "good swimmer," suddenly sank while swimming in the Barge Canal between the Genesee River and Red Creek. His companion, Thomas Andrus, 15 of 217 Smith St. tried to rescue the boy in the murky water.

William Wilson, a scout leader, said the Mostyn boy was "athletically inclined, was a good swimmer, and played baseball and basketball. He called Gary 'a good boy scout'."

Ground Broken For New Pepsi Plant

More than 5000 attended ground breaking company and party for the all new super bottling refinery of the Pepsi Cola Co. in Auburn. The plant which will cost an estimated \$22 million

will not be only functional, but plans call for creating a show place similar to the Corning Glass Works, which should prove a real boon to the area's tourism industry.

Frank Staropoli, president of the Pepsi-Cola, Rochester, called upon several of the upstate Pepsi bottlers to take a bow and thank-fringer of the attitude of the Pepsi bottlers toward the parent company. He said, "We are all independent business men and we are working with the most humane corporation in America. You will find through the years that you are working for, and with, a corporation with a heart."

Contracts for the project have already been let and further bids will be opened this week for building four miles of roads within the factory site. Pepsi officials also announced that local labor, material and equipment would be used as far as possible in the plant construction and that an estimated 400 to 500 workmen would be employed to construct the seven buildings.

The company also announced plans for the construction of a \$14 million Pepsi syrup plant to supply area bottlers. The plant will employ 35 to 40 people and will be built as soon as possible.

The Pepsi Company will also build a loading basin about 130 feet wide and 500 feet long on the Barge Canal west of the plant to load and unload beet, raw cane, sugar and finished products. The factory will also have rail and truck terminals.

Pepsi estimated that the value of beet-pulp, a by-product, would be \$14 million a year and the value of molasses \$12 million a year.
