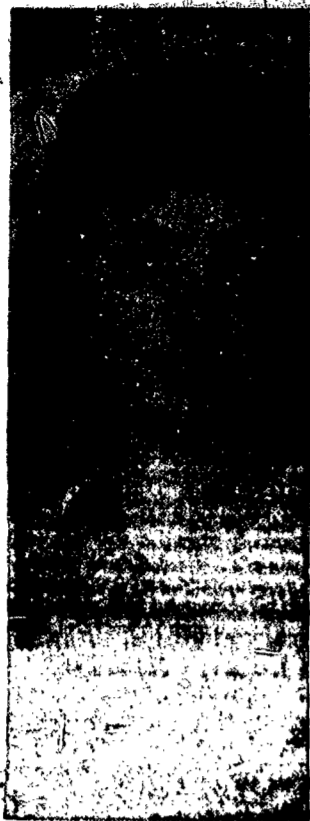


# Area Couples Recite Vows



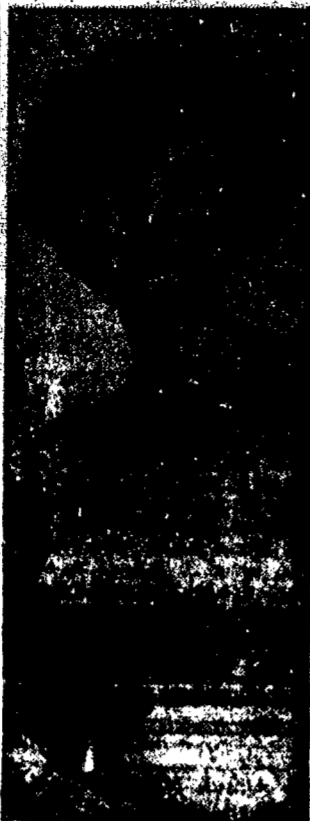
**MRS. JAMES HAHN**

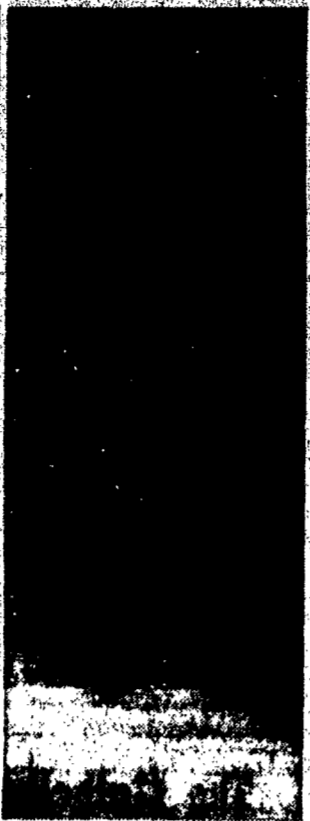
Wagner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Wagner, Magnolia St.

### Fashion Forecast

New York City's fashion shows in this hot, humid, hazy city (the temperature at this moment is 90 degrees), have but two words to say: WHEW! as far as the weather is concerned, WOW when it comes to fashion!

As Eleanor Lambert said in opening the American Designers' series this past Sunday afternoon at the Hotel Delmonico: "Fashion is getting back to fundamentals." Then she added, on screen, a color reproduction of (Goya's) Naked Maja, historically considered to be the Duchess of Alba. Then followed a series of her influences, the bare look, the wrapped head, feather headresses, the seductive, alluring look.

The opposing influence, Miss Lambert indicated inspired by the Empress Theodora as characterized by the Byzantine embroidery and tunic, Santa Sofia blue, the grand but austere look as evidenced in long sleeved evening dresses, monastic restraint, the Carlist or Crusader look of grey with pearls. This is the minor or second influence in the incoming fashions for Fall and Winter, according to Eleanor Lambert, an excellent sound authority.

So between the two, the Duchess of Alba and the Empress Theodora, fashion might well be engaged in a boxing match. Could be that fashion is up for grabs with a few other influences to reckon with. The influence of pop art and record houses giving rise to the "little dance dress, bare on top, crazy around the hemline. There's one thing you can be absolutely sure of: the little boy look we no longer dress as if we were little boys headed for a hike, has gone!

That doesn't mean that the little girl look is in. It's the bigger look. The truly feminine, seductive, alluring trend is already here in a great big way. There's more skin seen in direct competition to fabric than we've ever observed in many years of covering Fashion Week. Even the foreign influence is importantly featured, and the "kooky" look can't be laughed off any more. Femininity is rampant and while the alluring look isn't in for super-marketing, it's evident everywhere else.

The suit shape is soft and easy. Almost every suit has its own silk blouse to match the jacket lining, often lightly tied as opposed to the unrestrictive overblouse of other seasons past. A skirt has movement gained in many ways, all pleats, pleats, panel folds, godets such. Coats are most often seen buttonless, wrapped around and clutched. Off-center closures are evident throughout. 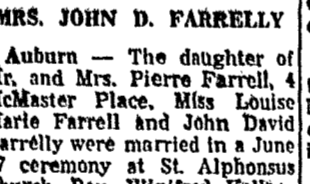
