

Requiem Mass Offered For Sr. M. Theodosia

Sister Mary Theodosia (O'Hagan), of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy, died Sunday, July 19, in Saint Joseph's Hospital, conducted by the Sisters of Mercy in Savannah, Georgia. She was 77 years old and had been in religious life for 57 years.

Originally hospitalized for a fractured hip, she suffered while visiting the Sisters of Mercy at Saint Vincent's Hospital, Savannah, Sister Theodosia was comatose satisfactorily until a heart attack left her in a critical condition for a week previous to her death.

MOTHER MARY BRIDE, Mother General of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy, flew to Sister Theodosia's bedside at the time of her accident, July 7. Following her heart attack, Mother Mary Bride, sent Sister Mary Rose, Motherhouse infirmary nurse, to Georgia with instructions to remain with Sister Mary Theodosia, throughout her illness until able to return to Rochester.

Sister Mary Theodosia taught for fifty years in schools of the Rochester diocese, including instruction on every level from first through ninth. She served on the faculty of Aquinas Institute, teaching algebra and religion. Her last assignments were Saint Thomas, Saint Cecilia, and Saint Andrew Schools, having previously taught at Holy Cross and Mount Carmel Schools in Rochester.

She likewise taught at Saint Mary's and Saint Vincent Schools in Corning, Saint Cecilia's in Elmira, and Saint Ann's in Hornell. She was superior and principal for a five-year term at Saint Patrick's Owego. She has been serving as assistant librarian at Catherine McAuley College since her retirement from teaching in 1961.

Sister Theodosia was a graduate of Canisius College, Buffalo, and had pursued further courses at the University of Rochester.

A native of Rexville, Sister Mary Theodosia is survived by a sister, Mrs. Joseph Heintz, Saint Petersburg, Florida, a niece and two nephews.

Housing Units Promised For Eucharist Congress

Bombay—(RNS)— India's State of Maharashtra has offered to build 1,000 one- and two-room housing units to accommodate visitors attending the 38th International Eucharist Congress here, Nov. 28-Dec. 6.

State Minister for Food, Civil Supplies and Housing, Hiral J. Taleyarkhan said, however, that the offer was contingent on receipt from the central government of 4,000 tons of cement before the end of July.

The offer was made at a top-level conference at which state government and Congress officials discussed housing, food, transportation and other needs for the thousands of persons expected to attend the nine-day Roman Catholic Congress.

IFCA Convention To Mark Cultural Enrichment Golden Jubilee In Capital Launched in Cleveland

International Federation of Catholic Alumnae will celebrate the golden jubilee of its founding at its national convention in the Sheraton-Park Hotel, Washington, Aug. 18-23.

Made up of alumnae groups with more than a million members from 350 U.S. Catholic colleges and high schools, the IFCA was founded in 1914 by

two alumnae of St. Joseph's College in Emmitsburg, Md. TODAY THE work of the federation is carried on through departments of education, literature, social service, and motion pictures, and a Bureau of Sister's Scholarships, which since 1924 has awarded more than 3,000 scholarships for advanced study to members of 35 religious communities engaged in teaching.

The motion picture department work with the National Legion of Decency in providing moral evaluations of movies. The IFCA has also been active in efforts to secure the beatification of Blessed Mother Elizabeth Seton, founder of the Sister of Charity in the U.S. It secured some 152,000 signatures on a petition for this purpose.

A highlight of the golden jubilee convention will be a Sanctified Mass of thanksgiving offered Aug. 23, in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception by Bishop Jerome D. Hannan of Scranton, Pa., at the Mercy Memorial Altar donated to the shrine by the federation. Bishop Hannan will preside at the installation of new IFCA national officers at this time.
