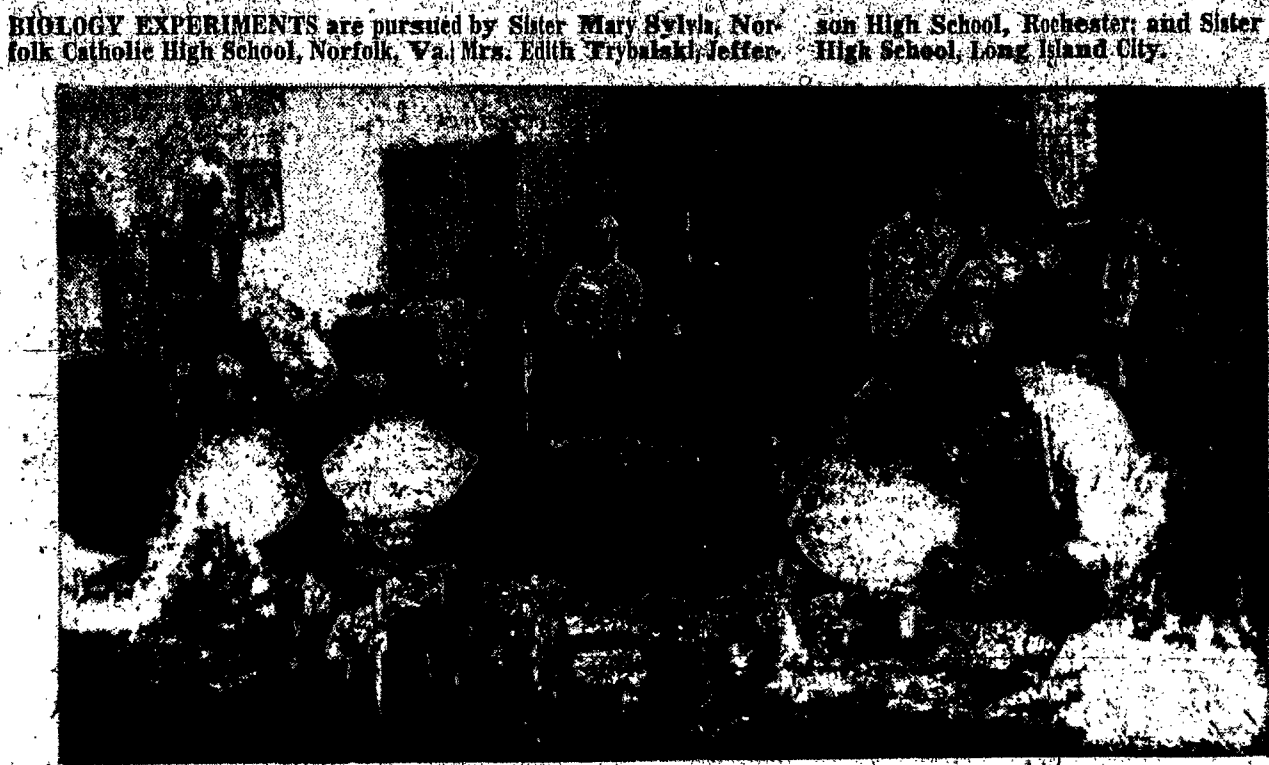

Biology Beats the Heat At Nazareth Workshop

Interested in taking your mind off the heat?

Why not try a Biological Science Curriculum Study—Yellow Version?

A trifle far-fetched for the average citizen—but not for the ten "epist" secondary school teachers who are learning how to put together a modern biology course at Nazareth College.

They are all participating in a program launched by the

American Institute of Biological Studies to equalize teachers with recent developments in science and pinpoint problems in biology still to be solved. The Biological Sciences Curriculum Study, as it is called, comes in three colors: yellow, blue and green. The yellow version now being taught at Nazareth, takes a college and post-college approach to biology: blue, biochemical and physiological; and green, ecological and evolutionary.

THE COURSE consists of lectures, basic techniques, demonstrations and laboratory work. Specimen-collecting field trips are taken to Powder Mill Park, Niagara Falls and Mendon Pond. Ward's National Science Establishment was also visited by the class.

Many of the students currently enrolled in the Nazareth program will put into effect a B.S.C.S. lab-centered program in their own schools within the next year or two.

Sister Francis Solano, S.S.J., is director of the program. She is being assisted by Sister M. Joan, S.S.J., and John Young, director of Education Services at Ward's National Science Establishment. Miss Jean Worth, a Nazareth graduate, is also assisting in the course.

The workshop will end August 5.
