

Radio Aids Hondurans

Radio aids Hondurans in their struggle to improve their homes and their lives.

Their teachers in Radio Schools of Honduras, modeled on those begun in Colombia in 1937. An American priest has just been named Honduras' assistant director of the project by Archbishop Hector Santos at Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

He is Father John J. Landers, one of three priests of the New York archdiocese assigned to a mission staffed by the New York State Home for a visit, in part to help with the schools and the success they have had.

RADIO SCHOOLS of Honduras broadcast six days a week for three months, buying time from a Catholic radio station in Tegucigalpa. Parents cluster around sets in the remote villages, where a total investment of about \$25, including \$17.50 for the radio, is shared among about 20 people who have a year to make their profits. The cost includes pencils, paper and workbooks used at the direction of the announcer.

There is also a blackboard for use by the village monitor. Monitors are trained by a coordinator, who in turn has been trained by a regional director. The regional directors have gotten their instruction from the present director.

"There are four regional directors now," Father Landers said. "Inside a year I hope to have 10. Each regional director is responsible for 12 areas of coordinators, who in turn are each responsible for 75 monitors."

The U.S. government is interested in the program, Father Landers said. "We have 15 Peace Corps people working as assistant coordinators," he said, "observing the personnel and the smoothness of the operation and advising me. I expect 15 more Peace Corps in the fall."

In addition, the Agency for International Development is helping with supplies. Last month it provided \$10,000 worth of stationery.

Also helping are the German bishops, who have earmarked \$1,000 for the program.

is the program effective? Father Landers tells of one village of about 700 people where a man has constructed a concrete latrine and has installed a cement floor in his house. He has also terraced his land and planted vegetables — which he has never seen before. He did it all according to the exact instructions he heard on the radio school.

"Now the people of the village — what the man has done," the priest said. "He now tells that his children no longer have as many cockroaches as they once had since he made the concrete floor. They will see him getting food from his garden. Then others will want to do as he has done."

Illiteracy is another problem the schools are attempting to overcome. "When an Indian man of about 60 years to write his name for the first time, he usually cries," Father Landers said. "You watch him laboriously form the letters at the blackboard and you are a nervous wreck with him. It is the first time anyone has ever helped him develop something inside himself."

There is also a blackboard for use by the village monitor. Monitors are trained by a coordinator, who in turn has been trained by a regional director. The regional directors have gotten their instruction from the present director.
