

Catholic Papers Gain Magazines Dip Again

New York — (NC) — Catholic newspapers in the United States continued to grow in number and circulation in the past year, while circulation of Catholic magazines continued a decline of several years' standing, according to statistics contained in the 1964-65 edition of the Catholic Press Directory.

Circulation of 614 Catholic newspapers, magazines and diocesan directories listed in the new directory published by the Catholic Press Association, stood at 28,332,500 as of Jan. 1, 1964—a decline of 1.1% from the total last year of 28,847,343.

This decline resulted from a 3.6% drop in total Catholic magazine circulation, despite a 4.7% increase in newspaper circulation, according to James A. Doyle, CPA executive secretary, who released the figures.

Total circulation for 151 Catholic newspapers in the U.S., Canada and the West Indies was 6,032,082. Circulation reported by 408 Catholic magazines was 21,910,568. Fifty-five diocesan directories recorded a circulation of 389,850.


