CCD Vacation Schools Draw 4,816 Pupils

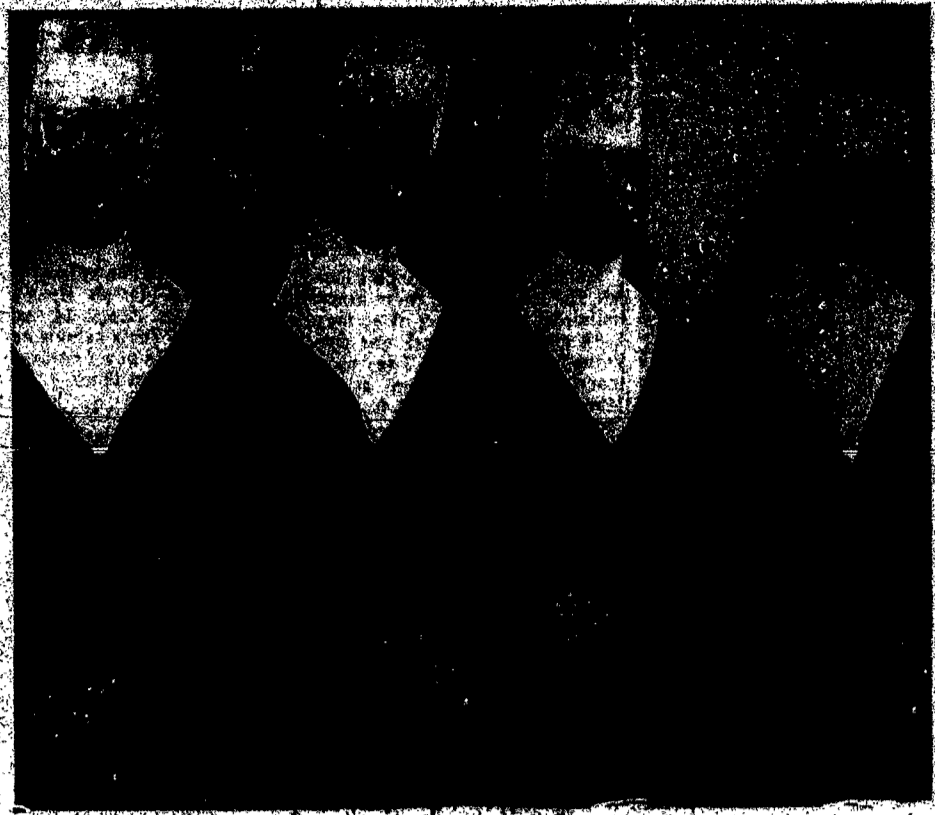
Some 4,816 public school students successfully completed vacation schools held throughout the diocese according to Rev. Albert Schnack, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

Again this year religious vacation schools were conducted in many parishes which have a parochial school for the benefit of public schoolers, as well as in smaller parishes without their own schools.

Engaged in teaching this summer were 92 Sisters of St. Joseph, 43 Sisters of Mercy and 16 School Sisters of Notre Dame, assisted by many trained CCD lay catechists.

National Convention Lists Local Mission Leaders

Students from the Rochester area will play significant parts in the 21st national convention of the Catholic Student Movement (CSMC) to be held Aug. 27-30 at Notre Dame University.

Although there will be high level addresses by national speakers, local mission experts and leaders from the local CSMC units will make this year's meeting a do-it-yourself convention by serving as discussion panelists, hosts for sectional meetings and members of regional choirs.

Mary Jane Scherth, of Our Lady of Mercy High School, will participate in the discussion on the apostolate to the Negro. This meeting will be chaired by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward A. Fything, STD, Executive Chairman of the Board of the CSMC.

Mary Ann Nally, a student at St. Agnes High School, has been appointed to take part in a panel discussion on Migrants, Appalachians, and Spanish Speaking Peoples.

Students from Nazareth Academy and Our Lady of Mercy High School will serve as hosts for various meetings during the convention.

Sister Mary Judith, O.L.M., CSMC moderator of Our Lady of Mercy High School will serve as chairman of one of the meetings concentrating on fund raising.

MAJOR SPEAKERS at the convention, which is expected to draw 4,000 student delegates, and moderators, will include Archbishop Karl J. Alter of Cincinnati, national president of the CSMC, and Bishop John J. Wright of Pittsburgh.

Bishop Wright will give the keynote address of "A World United" at the opening session to be held Thursday evening.

His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Tien, S.V.D., exiled Archbishop of Peking and Apostolic Administrator of Taipei, Formosa, will be present at the convention. He will preside over the meeting on China.

Rev. Frederick A. McGuire, C.M., Executive Secretary of the Mission Secretariat of the National Catholic Welfare Conference will be chairman during the meetings on Africa and the Peace Corps.

Shelley Heads Catholic Vets

Charles F. Shelley, 48-year-old World War II veteran, from Brooklyn, New York, has been elected at the 29th Annual National Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio, to lead the Catholic War Veterans of the U.S.A.

National Commander Shelley, a Sales Representative with Spelman Chevrolet of New York City, is a father of six children, who served with the 78th Division and holds decorations including the Purple Heart, Silver Star, European Theater and American Defense Citations.

Taking over the gavel of responsibility from outgoing Commander Walter D. Hills, Jr., of Baltimore, Commander Shelley called for a dedication of all Americans to the principles outlined in the Constitution of the U.S.A. for a more active participation of our people in the affairs of their government, and a new spirit of cooperation and understanding throughout our land.

Commander Shelley outlined an initial program urging all citizens, whatever their political persuasion, to take part in the great decisions leading to the 1964 national elections. Echoing the non-partisan Register and Vote campaign slogan, he said "Vote and the choice is yours—don't vote and the choice is theirs—Register or you can't vote."
