## New Mass Setting Draws On Spirituals

Washington—(NC)—A musical setting for the Mass that draws its inspiration in part from Negro spirituals is winning acceptance in parishes throughout the country. Entitled "An American Mass Program," it has been described by a reviewer for the trade magazine Billboard as being "like Gregorian chant touched with the blues." The music is the work of Father Clarence J. Rivers, 33, curate at St. Joseph's church in Cincinnati. Director of a Cincinnati dramatic group, he was first studying in the sacred and liturgical department at the Catholic University of America. Father Rivers composed his American Mass Program originally for his own liturgical group and later used it to develop a program of active participation in the Mass at St. Joseph's parish. During its first two years of use, much of the music was written down. Later, however, it was transcribed, and last year a recording of the setting was issued. The liturgical and scriptural texts in Father Rivers' program appear in English translation.

## Playboy Club No Surprise Says Prelate

Cincinnati—(RNS)—The Ohio State Liquor Control Commission's granting of a liquor permit for a proposed Playboy Club here was assailed by a Catholic prelate. Auxiliary Bishop Paul E. Lohr, of Cincinnati, archdiocese and pastor of St. Louis church, located less than 200 feet from the club, said he was "disappointed but not surprised." He had earlier expressed disapproval of the issuance of a license to the club at a public hearing. Bishop Lohr said, "We are indeed disappointed but not surprised at the decision of the State Liquor Control Commission to grant the liquor license for a Playboy Club in Cincinnati. We know the tremendous pressure that would be brought to bear in this case, due to the very large investment of money already made and the national syndicate behind it. No ordinary little club would draw radio, TV and newspaper editorials, Chamber of Commerce and police department endorsement without considerable prodding the place where it counts. "This meant civic leaders had to take the ridiculous position of pegging the downtown revival on the presence of a Playboy Club to enter healthily into the future. We admit to the title of 'Boys at Play' and euphemistically call their playmates 'Bunnies' or the more shortsighted position that it is no danger to public morals because it is well policed from within. "By law we were requested to express our approval or disapproval of a liquor license being granted to a club—upon which, of course, its existence depended. "We obeyed the law and indicated our disapproval with a view to the present saturation of the area, because of our present concern about the professed and proved lack of moral principles on the part of the group sponsoring the club, which also publishes an openly salacious magazine of more than two-million circulation. "We have performed our duty and have highlighted the danger. Now it is up to the people to decide by their rate of patronage whether they want this blight on the community or not; for there is really only one power this type of enterprise has—the power of the dollar sign."

## Mass to be Said in Maori Tongue

Auckland—(RNS)—Archbishop James A. Liston announced that New Zealand's 30,000 Catholic Maoris will soon be able to hear portions of the Mass in their native language. The archbishop said that the Maori tongue also will be used in the administration of Sacraments, according to new Church regulations approved by the Holy See.
