

Father Mooney Funeral

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Rochester in 1930 and served as their chaplain for seven years. Father Mooney was director of the Catholic Hour on radio for fifteen years, and pioneered in interfaith "dialogue" through an historic series of discussions with Protestant minister Rev. Dr. Justin Wine Nixon, broadcast by radio station WHAM in 1929.

In 1931 Father Mooney reorganized the Catholic Courier as the official diocesan paper and served as its managing editor for eleven years.

That same year he was appointed moderator for the diocesan Council of Catholic Men and directed it for six years. Later in 1934 he was named moderator for the diocesan Council of Catholic Women and for twelve years guided and expanded that organization throughout the Diocese.

Father Mooney was appointed pastor of St. Patrick's Church in 1937. He remodeled the former St. Patrick's Cathedral parish hall into the church that now stands on Plymouth Avenue.

While pastor of St. Patrick's he organized the Nocturnal Adoration Society for Rochester and made St. Patrick's the original center of that devotion. He served as moderator of the Third Order Franciscans during this time.

In 1945 Father Mooney, in recognition of his long standing reputation in music appreciation, was named diocesan coordinator of music for the National Catholic Music Educators' Association.

After a pastorate of twenty-two years, Father Mooney resigned due to failing health and lived since 1959 as pastor emeritus at the parish rectory and later at St. Ann's Home.

Father Mooney is survived by one brother, John J. Mooney, of Canandaigua; two sisters, Mrs. Owen C. Rubin of Penn Yan and Mrs. Arthur J. O'Neill of Geneva.

Burial was in the priests' plot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Rochester.

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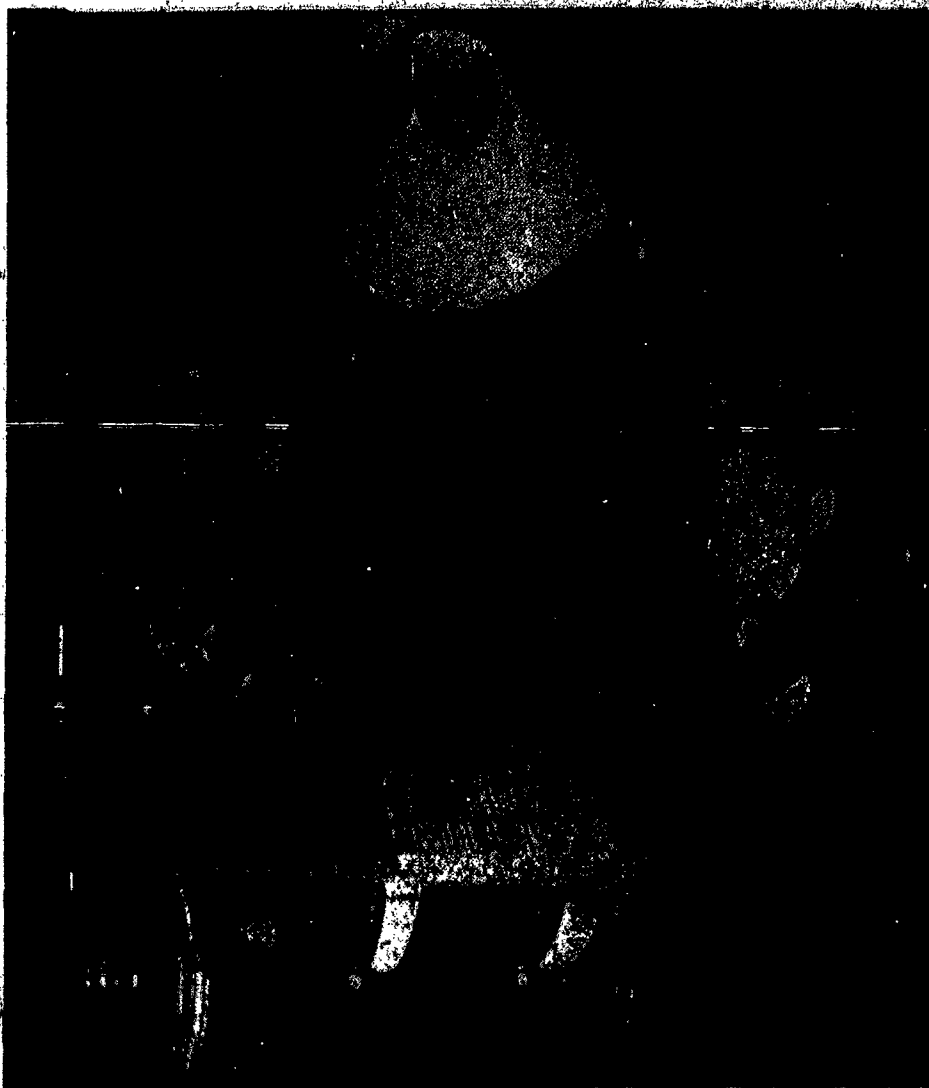
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Corvette for Lad at Fair

Vatican Radio: Lay Catechist 'Indispensable'

Vatican City—(RNS)—One of the most important results of the Second Vatican Council's third session will enhance and strengthen the role of the catechist in the Church. Vatican Radio said in a special broadcast.

The term Catechist was originally applied to one who instructs those about to receive baptism. It is now loosely applied to any individual, lay or priest, who teaches others, especially in missionary schools.

In a broadcast devoted to possible decisions of the Vatican Council's third session, the Vatican station said that "with the session only a month away, there begins to emerge, alongside so many promising features of its program for pastoral and ecumenical renewal, a new and exciting image of one of the Church's most familiar and least publicized heroes—the image of our mission catechist, his methods and his message attuned to the needs of our times."

It said the Schema on the Missions soon to be voted on "may be expected to enhance his work and perhaps provide him with a sort of canonical status within the hierarchy of our mission heralds and their helpers."

"But whether or not, the new image of the catechist is to differ radically from the old; the Council Fathers have already agreed solemnly that he is indispensable—this mission catechist of ours—and that his number, his competence and even his role, his revenues must increase."

The Vatican Radio broadcast was aired only a week before the scheduled opening of a Pan-African Catechetical Study Week at Masaka, Uganda, organized by Father John Hoffinger, S.J., famed catechetical specialist and director of the East Asian Pastoral Institute in Manila. Laurean Cardinal Rugambwa, Bishop of Bukoba, Tanganyika, a member of the Council's Commission on Missions, will address the delegates.

VATICAN RADIO went on to recall Pope Plus XI's encyclical in 1928 on the missions—*Humanae Ecclesiae*—which stressed the great importance of the catechist's role, as well as the address to the World Congress of the Lay Apostolate in 1957 in which Pope Plus XII also underscored the vital nature of the catechist's work.

In spite of the "extensive changes that have taken place recently in mission lands, and in spite of the changes already introduced or to be introduced as a result of Vatican Council decisions," it said, "the catechist will always be an indispensable figure in the mission landscape."

"Pope John XXIII, in his mission encyclical, *Principes Pastorum*, in 1959 could not but draw attention to the indispensable tasks performed by catechists, stressing that they were always the missionaries' right-hand men, sharing their labors and lightening their burdens."

"The missionaries in the field—namely those who attend the Second Vatican Council—agreed on this to a man. One of the spokesmen is Archbishop Bernardino Gani of Ostoneu in Dar es Salaam, West Africa, who is president of the Catechetical Commission of our West African episcopate."

"He said very emphatically that if we had no catechists, there would be few conversions. The few priests we have are literally occupied in looking after the Christians."

"It is the catechists who make contact with the pagans, who give the preliminary instruction, spiritual gifts and so highly valued, who keep the schools open and prepare the people for baptism."

"As for the present day, the Vatican station stressed that it is vital for the Church to 'adjust her pastoral techniques to new cultural and community conditions.'"

"Until now," it explained, "the catechist has been the inseparable companion of the priest in his efforts to get a foothold in a pagan land. But the work of the catechist in regions which are already Christian is bound to be quite different. The Council is therefore preparing to require of them a much more specialized form of training."

"No matter in what circumstances, the catechist must be equipped with such natural and spiritual gifts and be so highly trained that no one can look upon him as being, in any sense, a functionary appointed to help assist the missionary."

People to Participate at All Masses

ROME (AP)—Cardinal Giuseppe Siri said that the actual essence of the liturgical reforms is that people should be able to participate in all Masses.
